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Please give a brief description of the aims of the proposal

Withdrawl of the Welsh Governments Parking Permit provision for key workers.

On 26th March 2020, in response to the Covid 19 pandemic, the Welsh Government and British Parking Association instructed all members of the BPA to offer free parking to NHS workers and cancel any PCN's that had been issued to NHS staff since the beginning of the lockdown period both in public and private car parks.

Local Authorities were also given the option to offer this provision to key workers, as defined by the UK Government's guidelines. Although not a requirement, this offer was encouraged by the Welsh Government. MCC decided to support local businesses that remained operational throughout the Pandemic by offering them free parking as with NHS and Care Workers.

Now that non-essential shops are reopening across the country we are receiving a number of queries asking why key workers are still receiving the provision of free parking when staff of non-essential businesses that are now permitted to open have to pay for parking. The permit arrangements have therefore been reviewed and the following change is proposed:

1) Parking pass scheme for NHS and health and social care staff and NHS COVID 19 volunteers (critical care workers):

We propose to leave this scheme running without any changes.

	2) Permits for key workers We propose to inform permit holders on w/c 10th May that this scheme will be ending on 18th June. We will continue to issue new permits between now and then to eligible people, but will advise of the scheme end date.

Sex	There is a large female workforce in non-essential retail and hospitality businesses that are now re-opening. These women are often on low incomes and may be more likely than males to be working part time hours, may have been furloughed on reduced income for several months, but would have to pay for parking as they are not eligible for a permit. Conversely others working in essential retail or other key worker roles, many of which are health and caring roles which are proportionately more likely to be roles filled by women, have not had a period of reduced income and are receiving free parking. Socio-economic Duty and Social Justice	Those businesses that have been forced to close due to the Covid 19 pandemic and have had to furlough staff would no longer be disadvantaged in comparison to the businesses that have been permitted to remain open and have not had to furlough their employees. If the key workers permit provision were to continue then employees who have earned a lesser wage through furlough payments as opposed to their regular income would be being made to pay for their parking whilst those that have been earning a full wage throughout would continue to receive this provision. Withdrawing the Welsh Government Permit for Key Workers would mitigate any inequality toward the non-essential businesses and their staff.	Key Workers that have contributed to keeping the economy going throughout the pandemic will lose their offer of free parking throughout the County. NHS and care workers will continue to benefit from the offer of free parking for the time being and this may seem to be disadvantaging both key worker and general worker groups. We are reliant on business managers to make their employees aware that the scheme is ending. Key Workers that do not have the end date for the provision fed through to them by their manager will receive PCN's for parking whilst failing to pay and display.	At the time of application for the Welsh Government Permit all businesses were informed, via their dedicated managers, that the Permit Scheme would have an end date. All applicants were informed that, at the time the permit will be withdrawn, that they will receive communication from MCC stating the end sate and that normal pay and display arrangements would resume. The withdrawal of the NHS and Care Worker permits can only be decided by Welsh and Central Government and not by Local Authorities. Warning notices containing information on the permits withdrawal, as opposed to actual PCN's, will be placed on the key workers vehicles on 2 occasions allowing them time to confirm the status of the scheme with their managers or MCC before receiving an actual PCN.

Long Term	Balancing short term need with long term and planning for the future	The Welsh Government Permit Scheme, in relation to key workers, were guidelines only and it was up to the Local Authorities themselves as to whether or not they chose to offer this provision. MCC decided that we would offer this help to those businesses that were striving to deliver a service throughout the Pandemic and its subsequent lockdowns. Now the proposal is that we remove the scheme so as not to disadvantage others. Lockdown measures are easing and life is returning to a new normal.	We have already advised those in receipt of the permit that the scheme will end. We will ensure that we contact every designated manager at those businesses so as they can update their staff accordingly.
Collaboration	Working together with other partners to deliver objectives	We have worked with the businesses that have been in receipt of the permit now for over 12 months and also local NHS surgeries. We will continue to provide assistance to them in concluding the permit scheme. Though support for NHS surgeries will continue until we are informed by the BPA and Welsh Government otherwise or until the Welsh Government subsidy for lost income from those remaining permits ends.	We will remain in contact with the local businesses concerned until we have, to the best of our ability, ensured that all permit holders have been informed of the end of the provision.

Consulting businesses or workers on whether or not they would like free parking to remain would be highly likely to generate a response that the Council cannot deliver as it would not be financially sustainable and it would encourage single occupancy car use which is environmentally unsustainable. Asking the community if they would like something that cannot be delivered is not true engagement or consultation.	
Prevention	Putting resources into preventing problems occurring or getting worse	We will contact all relevant businesses allowing plenty of time for them to give staff notice that the scheme is ending, so as they are aware that pay and display, where applicable, will be required from the date decided upon. In addition, warning notices will be used for the immediate future to avoid unnecessary upset.

5. What evidence and data has informed the development of your proposal?

Enquiries are starting to come in from non-essential businesses and staff asking if they are eligible and can apply for the Government permit as they have observed them being displayed in other vehicles in their town. Benchmarking against other Local Authorities that have not issued the Welsh Government Permit to Key Workers and have only accepted them from NHS and Care Worker's that have been NHS administered. Lockdown rules are being relaxed as the pandemic eases and vaccination roll-out increases. Anecdotal evidence of increased car park use and data on car park income.

6. SUMMARY: As a result of completing this form, what are the main positive and negative impacts of your proposal, how have they informed/changed the development of the proposal so far and what will you be doing in future?

With the easing of lockdown restrictions and the non-essential businesses reopening, we are seeing a steady increase in questions relating to the Welsh Government parking permits and their purpose. With all businesses being now being open it would be unfair on those that have been closed and with staff on Furlough to expect them to pay for parking whilst businesses that have been permitted to stay open with staff on full wages, would continue to receive free parking.

The main negative impacts are that staff that have worked throughout the lockdowns will now lose this benefit. Also that it may take some time for managers to inform their staff that the permit period has ended.

We will inform the contact managers at the businesses involved of the permit scheme's end date and allow a grace period whereby warning notices are used instead of PCN's.
