In January County Councillors agreed that the new school's name was to be Ysgol 3-19 Brenin Harri'r VIII, King Henry VIII 3-19 School. The decision was made following a poll undertaken in conjunction with Abergavenny Town Council with views of pupils of both Deri View and King Henry VIII schools and the Abergavenny community being sought. The poll indicated that an overwhelming majority wanted the name King Henry VIII to be retained within the name of the new school.

What the Bird's See (A bird's eye view of our new school)



The steel beams, which are making their short journey from Usk, are currently being bolted to the foundations by a local construction team made up of past King Henry VIII School students! After Easter the full extent of our wonderful new school will be clear for all to see.



School design in safe hands

Year 5 pupils from Deri View Primary School demonstrate that school design can be both ethical and cost effective. In March, Owen and Georgie from Morgan Sindall presented Year 5 with a challenge to design a school that achieved the clients brief while remaining in budget.
