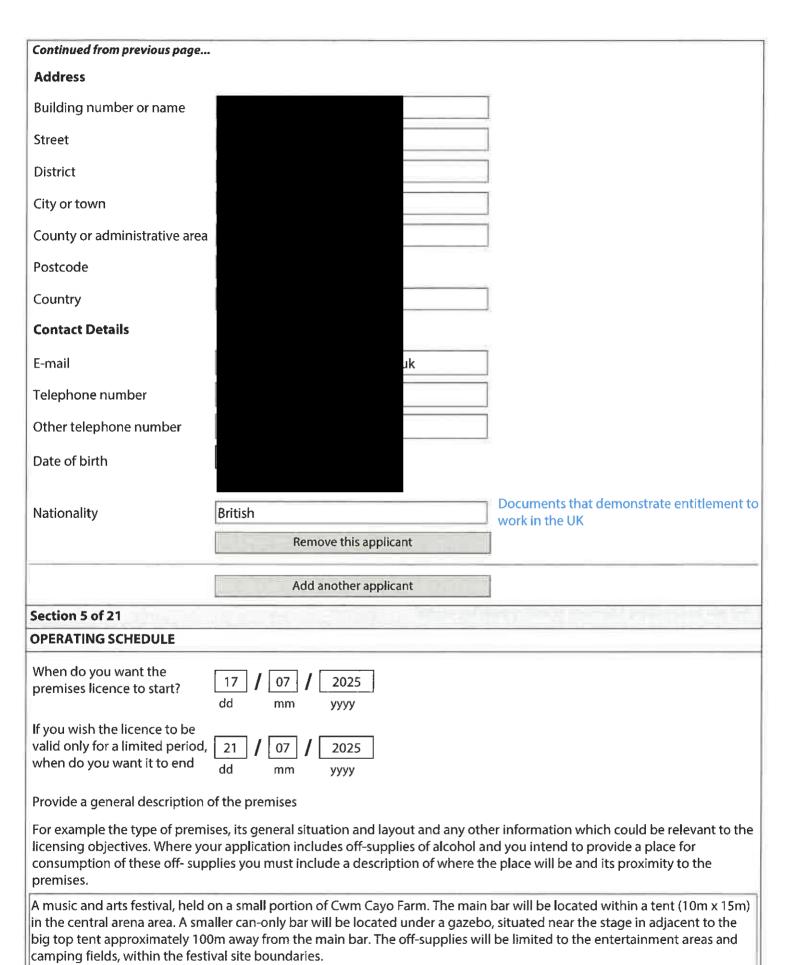

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# LICENSING OBJECTIVES

Describe the steps you intend to take to promote the four licensing objectives:

a) General – all four licensing objectives (b,c,d,e)

List here steps you will take to promote all four licensing objectives together.

Several precautions will be put in place to promote the licensing objectives. These are also covered in the Event Management Plan submitted for the event. A brief summary of steps taken will be:

Security will be SIA licensed with a solid knowledge of processes and procedures in place for the event.

Recording CCTV will be in place in key areas.

Anti-terrorism measures will be put in place in line with the Terrorism (Protection of Premises) Act 2025 and clear emergency response procedures communicated to all crew and volunteers.

Communications will be established on-site via radios, with the Event Control Office acting as a command and control centre, monitoring the event and communications across the site and also be ready to liaise with local authorities at any relevant time.

A qualified medical team will be available on-site throughout the duration of the event, contactable by radio and with appropriate signage so patrons, staff, and performers can easily find assistance if needed. Staff and stewards will be appropriately briefed on procedures for serious or minor incidents and an incident log will be maintained at the production office.

An experienced welfare team will be on site to provide non-medical advice and support throughout the event.

Procedures at the bars will be in place to avoid over consumption of alcohol and prevent any under-age drinking. A 'Challenge 25' policy will be in place. Bar staff will also be aware of the 'Ask for Angela' scheme and be trained to spot any anti-social behaviour.

Measures will also be in place to curb noise and public nuisance with amplified music ending as scheduled.

Risk assessments will be conducted prior to the event and health and safety monitored throughout the event and a traffic management plan will be put in place. These are also discussed in the Event Management Plan being submitted for the event.

b) The prevention of crime and disorder

Although alcohol will be available for sell at the event, there will be no promotions such as buy one get one free or similar that would encourage excessive consumption of alcohol.

A Challenge 25 Policy will be put in place with the bar maintaining a list of refusals and details of any fake identity documents.

There will be a strict limit on the amount of alcohol festival goers can bring onto the premises upon entrance to the event and return trips to the parking area will be limited and monitored by security and stewards. These limits on alcohol will be communicated to ticket-holders prior to the event.

There will be searches and preventative measures in place to ensure weapons or drugs are not brought on to the site, including random searches by SIA staff on all public and crew entering the festival and arena. A locked drugs amnesty bin

will be provided at the entrance to the arena, and the contents passed to the police at the end of the event.

Glass bottles or containers will not be brought on-site and any spirits will be decanted. The bar will maintain back-of-house control on any spirits and will utilise plastic containers where possible and serve drinks in plastic, reusable cups.

Bar staff, security and stewards will be made aware of the 'Ask for Angela' Scheme which is a scheme where patrons can use the code word "Angela" to alert staff that they are in a situation where they feel unsafe. Staff will also be trained in spotting any potential anti-social behaviour, unwanted sexual advances, or discrimination.

CCTV cameras will be positioned covering the bar areas and at the initial wristband-exchange entry point/arena entrance. CCTV footage will be kept for 90 days after the event and made available to the police upon request. Should there any technical problems with the CCTV recording, we will notify the police immediately.

Metal barriers will be in place to prevent unauthorised vehicles from entering the main arena and camp site.

We will ensure our obligations are met under the Terrorism (Protection of Premises) Act 2025. The event's Emergency Response Team will ensure emergency incident procedures are in place and communicated to all management, crew and volunteers. All event crew and volunteers will be required to undertake ACT online anti-terrorism training.

# c) Public safety

The festival grounds as a premises has more than sufficient space throughout for the numbers we will have in attendance.

There will be an ample amount of SIA security as well as stewards, volunteers and staff to safeguard against accidents, injuries or mishaps.

Tap water will also be provided at the bar and around the site free of charge.

There will be a qualified medical team on-site and several of the core staff and volunteers have also had First Aid training.

An experienced welfare team will be on-site to provide non-medical help and advice.

Appropriate Health and Safety precautions will be taken and procedures will be in place in case of fire or emergency as well as safeguards put in place to protect from basic mishaps such as slips, trips and falls. Staff and volunteers will be adequately trained in procedures.

Installation of stages, electrics, internal infrastructure, art and other installations will be conducted by responsible and qualified individuals.

All food vendors will be required to produce local authority food hygiene ratings of 5.

# d) The prevention of public nuisance

Signage on and off-site will be in place to provide safety for everyone involved. A Traffic Management Plan will also be in place, and stewards and traffic marshals to ensure safe movement in and around the site.

The majority of vehicle traffic onto and off the site will take place in daytime hours with limited entry or movement during the festival.

Noise controls will be in place in music performance areas and sound levels recorded, and music will be un-amplified as scheduled to reduce any disturbance to local residents. A Noise Management Plan has been agreed with Monmouthshire Environmental Health officers and will be strictly adhered to.

The event is fairly low in numbers and not in a heavy populated area and therefore not expected to cause any major disruption or inconvenience to local residents or neighbours.

Local residents in the immediate area will be contacted prior to the event, to make them aware of the event and offer a direct contact number for the event production office should they have any issue to discuss.

Local residents in the NP15 postcode area will be offered discounted tickets to the event.

The festival is a very green event and will make every effort to minimise any environmental damage, with a dedicated team to remind all patrons to keep the area clean. The site will not be left with any unnecessary rubbish.

# e) The protection of children from harm

Children are allowed at the event, although it is not specifically targeted at under-18s. All under-18s attending must be accompanied by a responsible parent or quardian.

Our Terms & Conditions, website and printed programme clearly state that parents/guardians are at all times fully responsible for the wellbeing and supervision of their children.

All under-18s will be given a distinctive wristband upon first entry, which will differentiate them from adult attendees, and their details logged. No alcohol will be sold to anyone not wearing an adult wristband.

Measures such as Challenge 25 will be put in place at the bars and bar staff will be briefed on their safeguarding responsibilities before the event.

No under-18s will be permitted in the bar tent after 8pm until close.

CCTV recording will be in place in the bar and children's activity area in addition to SIA security staff.

The event will not be hosting any adult entertainment, gambling activities, or viewing of inappropriate films that may attract be viewed by under 18s.

While alcohol will be served, the primary purpose of the event is to provide music and not the consumption of alcohol.

We have detailed Child Protection & Safeguarding policies and procedures (sent as a separate document) which will be distributed to event staff, crew, stewards and security prior to the event.

A designated Child Protection Representative will be on site at all times.

Key members of the crew involved with safeguarding or children's activities will be DBS checked.

#### NOTES ON DEMONSTRATING ENTITLEMENT TO WORK IN THE UK

# Entitlement to work/immigration status for individual applicants and applications from partnerships which are not limited liability partnerships:

A licence may not be held by an individual or an individual in a partnership who is resident in the UK who:

- does not have the right to live and work in the UK; or
- is subject to a condition preventing him or her from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity.

Any premises licence issued in respect of an application made on or after 6 April 2017 will become invalid if the holder ceases to be entitled to work in the UK.

Applicants must demonstrate that they have an entitlement to work in the UK and are not subject to a condition preventing them from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity. They do this in one of two ways: 1) by providing with this application copies or scanned copies of the documents listed below (which do not need to be certified), or 2) by providing their 'share code' to enable the licensing authority to carry out a check using the Home Office online right to work checking service (see below).

#### Documents which demonstrate entitlement to work in the UK

- An expired or current passport showing the holder, or a person named in the passport as the child of the
  holder, is A British citizen or a citizen of the UK and Colonies having the right of abode in the UK [please see
  note below about which sections of the passport to copy].
- An expired or current passport or national identity card showing the holder, or a person named in the passport as the child of the holder, is a national of a European Economic Area country or Switzerland.
- A Registration Certificate or document certifying permanent residence issued by the Home Office to a national
  of a European Economic Area country or Switzerland.
- A Permanent Residence Card issued by the Home Office to the family member of a national of a European Economic Area country or Switzerland.
- A current Biometric Immigration Document (Biometric Residence Permit) issued by the Home Office to the
  holder indicating that the person named is allowed to stay indefinitely in the UK, or has no time limit on their
  stay in the UK.
- A **current** passport endorsed to show that the holder is exempt from immigration control, is allowed to stay indefinitely in the UK, has the right of abode in the UK, or has no time limit on their stay in the UK.
- A current Immigration Status Document issued by the Home Office to the holder with an endorsement
  indicating that the named person is allowed to stay indefinitely in the UK or has no time limit on their stay in
  the UK, when produced in combination with an official document giving the person's permanent National
  Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A birth or adoption certificate issued in the UK, when produced in combination with an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A birth or adoption certificate issued in the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man or Ireland when produced in combination with an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A certificate of registration or naturalisation as a British citizen, when produced in combination with an
  official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a
  Government agency or a previous employer.

- A current passport endorsed to show that the holder is allowed to stay in the UK and is currently allowed to
  work and is not subject to a condition preventing the holder from doing work relating to the carrying on of a
  licensable activity.
- A current Biometric Immigration Document (Biometric Residence Permit) issued by the Home Office to the holder which indicates that the named person can currently stay in the UK and is allowed to work relation to the carrying on of a licensable activity.
- A **current** Residence Card issued by the Home Office to a person who is not a national of a European Economic Area state or Switzerland but who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights or residence.
- A current Immigration Status Document containing a photograph issued by the Home Office to the holder
  with an endorsement indicating that the named person may stay in the UK, and is allowed to work and is not
  subject to a condition preventing the holder from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity
  when produced in combination with an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance
  number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A Certificate of Application, less than 6 months old, issued by the Home Office under regulation 18(3) or 20(2) of the Immigration (European Economic Area) Regulations 2016, to a person who is not a national of a European Economic Area state or Switzerland but who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights of residence.
- Reasonable evidence that the person has an outstanding application to vary their permission to be in the UK
  with the Home Office such as the Home Office acknowledgement letter or proof of postage evidence, or
  reasonable evidence that the person has an appeal or administrative review pending on an immigration
  decision, such as an appeal or administrative review reference number.
- Reasonable evidence that a person who is not a national of a European Economic Area state or Switzerland but
  who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights of residence in exercising treaty rights in
  the UK including:-
  - evidence of the applicant's own identity such as a passport,
  - evidence of their relationship with the European Economic Area family member e.g. a marriage certificate, civil partnership certificate or birth certificate, and
  - evidence that the European Economic Area national has a right of permanent residence in the UK or is one of the following if they have been in the UK for more than 3 months:
    - (i) working e.g. employment contract, wage slips, letter from the employer,
    - (ii) self-employed e.g. contracts, invoices, or audited accounts with a bank,
    - (iii) studying e.g. letter from the school, college or university and evidence of sufficient funds; or
    - (iv) self-sufficient e.g. bank statements.

Family members of European Economic Area nationals who are studying or financially independent must also provide evidence that the European Economic Area national and any family members hold comprehensive sickness insurance in the UK. This can include a private medical insurance policy, an EHIC card or an S1, S2 or S3 form.

**Original documents must not be sent to licensing authorities.** If the document copied is a passport, a copy of the following pages should be provided:-

- (i) any page containing the holder's personal details including nationality;
- (ii) any page containing the holder's photograph;
- (iii) any page containing the holder's signature;
- (iv) any page containing the date of expiry; and
- (v) any page containing information indicating the holder has permission to enter or remain in the UK and is permitted to work.

If the document is not a passport, a copy of the whole document should be provided.

Your right to work will be checked as part of your licensing application and this could involve us checking your immigration status with the Home Office. We may otherwise share information with the Home Office. Your licence application will not be determined until you have complied with this guidance.

# Home Office online right to work checking service

As an alternative to providing a copy of the documents listed above, applicants may demonstrate their right to work by allowing the licensing authority to carry out a check with the Home Office online right to work checking service.

To demonstrate their right to work via the Home Office online right to work checking service, applicants should include in this application their 9-digit share code (provided to them upon accessing the service at <a href="https://www.gov.uk/prove-right-to-work">https://www.gov.uk/prove-right-to-work</a>) which, along with the applicant's date of birth (provided within this application), will allow the licensing authority to carry out the check.

In order to establish the applicant's right to work, the check will need to indicate that the applicant is allowed to work in the United Kingdom and is not subject to a condition preventing them from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity.

An online check will not be possible in all circumstances because not all applicants will have an immigration status that can be checked online. The Home Office online right to work checking service sets out what information and/or documentation applicants will need in order to access the service. Applicants who are unable to obtain a share code from the service should submit copy documents as set out above.

NOTES ON REGULATED ENTERTAINMENT

In terms of specific regulated entertainments please note that:

- Plays: no licence is required for performances between 08:00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
- Films: no licence is required for 'not-for-profit' film exhibition held in community premises between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day provided that the audience does not exceed 500 and the organiser (a) gets consent to the screening from a person who is responsible for the premises; and (b) ensures that each such screening abides by age classification ratings.
- Indoor sporting events: no licence is required for performances between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 1000.
- Boxing or Wrestling Entertainment: no licence is required for a contest, exhibition or display of Greco-Roman
  wrestling, or freestyle wrestling between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not
  exceed 1000. Combined fighting sports defined as a contest, exhibition or display which combines boxing or
  wrestling with one or more martial arts are licensable as a boxing or wrestling entertainment rather than an
  indoor sporting event.
- Live music: no licence permission is required for:
  - o a performance of unamplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, on any premises.
  - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day on premises authorised to sell alcohol for consumption on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
  - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a workplace that is not licensed to sell alcohol on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
  - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a church hall, village hall, community hall, or other similar community premises, that is not licensed by a premises licence to sell alcohol, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance from a person who is responsible for the premises.
  - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, at the non-residential premises of (i) a local authority, or (ii) a school, or (iii) a hospital, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance on the relevant premises from: (i) the local authority concerned, or (ii) the school or (iii) the health care provider for the hospital.
- Recorded Music: no licence permission is required for:
  - o any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day on premises authorised to sell alcohol for consumption on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
  - o any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a church hall, village hall, community hall, or other similar community premises, that is not licensed by a premises licence to sell alcohol, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance from a person who is responsible for the premises.
  - o any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, at the non-residential premises of (i) a local authority, or (ii) a school, or (iii) a hospital, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance on the relevant premises from: (i) the local authority concerned, or (ii) the school proprietor or (iii) the health care provider for the hospital.

- Dance: no licence is required for performances between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 500. However, a performance which amounts to adult entertainment remains licensable.
- Cross activity exemptions: no licence is required between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, with no limit on audience size for:
  - o any entertainment taking place on the premises of the local authority where the entertainment is provided by or on behalf of the local authority;
  - o any entertainment taking place on the hospital premises of the health care provider where the entertainment is provided by or on behalf of the health care provider;
  - o any entertainment taking place on the premises of the school where the entertainment is provided by or on behalf of the school proprietor; and
  - o any entertainment (excluding films and a boxing or wrestling entertainment) taking place at a travelling circus, provided that (a) it takes place within a moveable structure that accommodates the audience, and (b) that the travelling circus has not been located on the same site for more than 28 consecutive days.

\*If the premises rateable value is in Bands D or E and the premises is primarily used for the consumption of alcohol on the premises then your are required to pay a higher fee

Band D - £87001 to £12500 £900.00

Band E - £125001 and over £1,905.00

There is an exemption from the payment of fees in relation to the provision of regulated entertainment at church halls, chapel halls or premises of a similar nature, village halls, parish or community halls, or other premises of a similar nature. The costs associated with these licences will be met by central Government. If, however, the licence also authorises the use of the premises for the supply of alcohol or the provision of late night refreshment, a fee will be required.

Schools and sixth form colleges are exempt from the fees associated with the authorisation of regulated entertainment where the entertainment is provided by and at the school or college and for the purposes of the school or college.

If you operate a large event you are subject to ADDITIONAL fees based upon the number in attendance at any one time
