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Non – Technical Summary

In June 2021, Archaeology Wales was commissioned by Monmouthshire Housing Association to carry out an Archaeological Desk-Based Assessment and site visit to determine the archaeological potential of Land East of the A465, Abergavenny, centred on NGR SO 30932 13929. The assessment has been undertaken in support of the promotion of the site as a Candidate for residential development within the forthcoming Monmouthshire County Council Local Development Plan review.

No Registered Historic Landscape, Scheduled Monument, Listed Building or Conservation Area will be directly or indirectly affected by the proposed development. However, the southern boundary of the site borders land designated as part of the essential setting for the Grade II Registered Historic Park and Garden of Colbrook House (Gt30) with the potential to have a minor indirect (visual) impact on its setting.

Three sites of potential archaeological interest have been identified within the proposed development area. The first: Kiln Site, Little Skirrid (GGAT03976g) is already recorded on the HER and could be of medium (regional) value. Two further sites of low (local) value have been identified during research for this report: Former Farmstead and outbuildings at Roc House Farm, Abergavenny (LEA001); and Remains of ridge and furrow and lynchets at Roc House Farm, Abergavenny (LEA002). It is expected that the proposed development will impact on these potential heritage assets, but this impact can be mitigated through suitable archaeological condition.

Crynodeb Annhechnegol

Ym mis Mehefin 2021, comisiynwyd Archaeoleg Cymru gan Gymdeithas Tai Sir Fynwy i gynnal Asesiad Desg Archeolegol ac ymweliad safle i bennu potensial archeolegol Tir Dwyrain yr A465, y Fenni, a oedd yn canolbwyntio ar NGR SO 30932 13929. Cynhaliwyd yr asesiad i gefnogi hyrwyddo'r safle fel Ymgeisydd ar gyfer datblygiad preswyl yn adolygiad arfaethedig Cynllun Datblygu Lleol Cyngor Sir Fynwy.

Ni fydd y datblygiad arfaethedig yn effeithio'n uniongyrchol nac yn anuniongyrchol ar unrhyw Dirwedd Hanesyddol Gofrestredig, Heneb Gofrestredig, Adeilad Rhestredig neu Ardal Gadwraeth. Fodd bynnag, mae ffin ddeheuol y safle yn ffinio â thir a ddynodwyd yn rhan o'r lleoliad hanfodol ar gyfer Parc Hanesyddol Cofrestredig Gradd II a Gardd Colbrook House (Gt30) gyda'r potensial i gael effaith anuniongyrchol (weledol) fach ar ei lleoliad.

Mae tri safle o ddiddordeb archeolegol posibl wedi'u nodi yn yr ardal ddatblygu arfaethedig. Mae'r cyntaf: Safle Kiln, Little Skirrid (GGAT03976g) eisoes wedi'i gofnodi ar yr HER a gallai fod o werth canolig (rhanbarthol). Mae dau safle arall o werth isel (lleol) wedi'u nodi yn ystod ymchwil ar gyfer yr adroddiad hwn: Hen Ffermdy ac adeiladau allanol yn Fferm Roc House, Y Fenni (LEA001); ac Olion cefnen a ffwrch a lynchets yn Fferm Roc House, Y Fenni (LEA002). Disgwylir y bydd y datblygiad arfaethedig yn effeithio ar yr asedau treftadaeth posibl hyn, ond gellir lliniaru'r effaith hon drwy gyflwr archeolegol addas.

1 Introduction

- 1.1 In June 2021, Archaeology Wales (AW) was commissioned by Monmouthshire Housing Association, to carry out an Archaeological Desk-Based Assessment and site visit to determine the archaeological potential of land East of the A465, Abergavenny, centred on NGR SO 30932 13929.; Figures 1 2; AW Project Number 2917).
- 1.2 This assessment has been prepared in support of the promotion of the site as a Candidate for residential development within the forthcoming Monmouthshire County Council Local Development Plan review. The purpose of the Desk-Based Assessment, which is detailed in the following report, is to provide the local planning authority, Monmouthshire County Council (MCC) with the information they are likely to request in respect of the proposed development, the requirements for which are set out in Planning Policy Revised Edition 10, Section 6.1 (2018) and Technical Advice Note (TAN) 24: The Historic Environment (2017). The work is to highlight and assess the impact upon standing and buried remains of potential archaeological interest and to ensure that they are fully investigated and recorded if they are disturbed or revealed as a result of subsequent activities associated with the development.
- 1.3 Detailed plans are not yet available. The outline plan for the proposed development area is shown in Figure 2. The site is located east of, and adjacent to, the current urban area of Abergavenny. The parcel of land measures approximately 24.8 hectares, situated east of the A465. The site currently comprises open countryside / greenfield land used for agricultural purposes.
- 1.4 It is understood that the proposed development will comprise primarily residential units, as well as a hotel, supermarket and retail outlets, small office / work units, POS, play provision, flood attenuation, infrastructure new and existing GI. The site runs parallel with the A465 extending from that corridor to a contour elevation of 120m on the west facing slopes of Ysgyryd Fach (Little Skirrid).

2 Site Description

- 2.1 The proposed development is a candidate site for the forthcoming Monmouthshire County Council Local Development Plan. It is understood that the proposed development would comprise the construction of new housing stock, roads, retail and hospitality space associated infrastructure, amenity space and associated landscaping on land east of the A465, Abergavenny, centred on SO 30932 13929 (Figure 1 and 2).
 - The proposed development area currently comprises open countryside / greenfield land used for agricultural purposes. The western border of the site is defined by the Abergavenny Settlement boundary.
- 2.2 The site is approximately rectangular in plan (Figure 2) and comprises 24.8 hectares of agricultural fields. It lies on a west facing slope at the foot of Ysgyryd Fach between the 120m and 80m contours. It is partly bounded on the northwest by the A465, to the

northeast by land associated with the properties of Caederwen and Garth Farm, to the east by land associated with Little Skirrid, and to the south and west by agricultural fields.

The site lies approximately 150m east of Abergavenny rail station and 1km ESE of the historic core of Abergavenny.

2.3 The underlying geology for the site comprises argillaceous rocks and interbedded Sandstone, of the St Maughans Formation, sedimentary bedrock formed approximately 393 to 419 million years ago in the Devonian Period. The bedrock is overlain by Devensian Till, Diamicton: superficial deposits formed up to 2 million years ago in the Quaternary Period. There are no borehole data available for the site on the Geology of Britain Viewer website, although there is data available from a series of boreholes dug for Monmouthshire County Council along the line of the Abergavenny Eastern Bypass (A465) immediately to the west of the site (BGS, Geology of Britain Viewer – accessed 26/07/2021). The soils are classed as freely draining slightly acid loamy soils (http://www.landis.org.uk/soilscapes/ - accessed 26/07/21).

3 Methodology

- 3.1 The primary objective of this desk-based assessment is to assess the impact of the development proposals on the historic environment. This will help inform future decision making, design solutions and potential mitigation strategies. The aim is to make full and effective use of existing information in establishing the archaeological significance of the site, to elucidate the presence or absence of archaeological material, its character, distribution, extent, condition and relative significance.
- 3.2 The work includes a comprehensive assessment of regional context within which the archaeological evidence rests and aims to highlight any relevant research issues within national and regional research frameworks.
- 3.3 This report provides information of sufficient detail to allow informed planning decisions to be made which can safeguard the archaeological resource. Preservation *in situ* has been advocated where at all possible, but where engineering or other factors could result in the loss of archaeological deposits, preservation by record has been recommended.
- 3.4 This assessment considers the following:
 - a) The nature, extent and degree of survival of archaeological sites, structures, deposits and landscapes within the study area through assessment of various readily available primary sources as listed below.
 - Collation and assessment of all relevant information held in the regional HER at GGAT within a 1km radius of the development site.
 - Collation and assessment of all Designated archaeological sites within a 5km radius of the development site.
 - Assessment of all available excavation reports and archives including unpublished and unprocessed material affecting the site and its setting.
 - Assessment of aerial photographic (AP) and satellite imagery evidence.

- Assessment of archive records held at the County Archive, the National Library of Wales (NLW) and the Royal Commission on Ancient and Historical Monuments in Wales (RCAHMW);
- Records held by the developer e.g. bore-hole logs, geological/geomorphological information, aerial photographs, maps, plans, ztv data.
- Map regression analysis using all relevant cartographic sources e.g. all editions of the Ordnance Survey County Series, Tithe and early estate maps (as available);
- Place-name evidence.
- Historic documents (e.g. charters, registers, estate papers).

Section 11 below provides a representative list of documentary sources available in regional and National archives. The most relevant archive materials to this report, such as antiquarian maps, have been sourced and viewed online and the information contained within them, incorporated into this assessment. Other archival materials, not available online, do not relate directly to the proposed development site itself, but more generally to Abergavenny and their relevance to the current report is generally limited.

- b) The significance of any remains in their context both regionally and nationally and in light of the findings of the desk-based study.
- c) The history of the site.
- d) The potential visual impact of any proposed development on the setting of known sites of archaeological importance.
- e) The potential for further archaeological remains to be present, which have not been identified in pre-existing archaeological records.
- f) The potential for further work, with recommendations where appropriate for a suitable investigative and/or mitigation methodology.
- In assessing the value of archaeological assets, and the potential impacts upon them by the proposed development, the terms and guidance used in the Design Manual for Roads and Bridges, Volume 11, Section 3 (Highways England 2007) has been utilised. Values are given as:
 - Very High (World Heritage Sites and other sites of international importance).
 - High (Scheduled Monuments, undesignated assets of schedulable quality, assets of National importance that can contribute significantly to acknowledged national research objectives);
 - Medium (Designated or undesignated assets of Regional importance that contribute to regional research objectives);
 - Low (assets of local importance, assets compromised by poor preservation or poor survival of contextual associations);
 - Negligible (assets with little or no surviving archaeological interest);
 - Unknown (the importance of the resource has not been ascertained).

The magnitude of the potential impact on the archaeological assets (which can be either positive or negative), is given as:

- Major (change to most or all key archaeological materials, such that the resource is totally altered; comprehensive changes to setting).
- Moderate (changes to many key archaeological materials, such that the resource is clearly modified; considerable changes to setting that affect the character of the asset).
- Minor (changes to key archaeological materials, such that the asset is slightly altered; slight changes to setting).
- Negligible (very minor changes to archaeological materials or setting).
- No Change
- 3.6 This work conforms to the Standard and Guidance for Archaeological Desk-Based Assessment, as produced by the Chartered Institute for Archaeologists (CIfA 2020).

4 Archaeological and Historical Background

- 4.1 Previous Archaeological Studies (Figure 3; Appendix I)
- 4.1.1 There are 57 archaeological investigations recorded on the regional Historic Environment Record within a search area of 1km around the proposed development site. All these interventions have taken place within the urban area of Abergavenny to the NW of the site (Figure 3). The most relevant to the proposed development site are listed below.
- 4.1.2 During August 2002 Border Archaeology were commissioned by Gwent Healthcare NHS Trust to undertake a desk-based assessment and walkover survey of Larchfield, Abergavenny (E004871), approximately 150m NNW of the proposed candidate site. Cartographic evidence suggests that the property was constructed between 1877 and 1881. The assessment recommended a program of building recording for the stable block (11095g) and Larchfield House (11096g), should they be impacted by any proposed development (Border Archaeology, 2002).
- 4.1.3 During 2008 GGAT conducted a desktop study of woodlands to produce management advice for new and existing sites under the Better Woodlands for Wales scheme (E006625). The woodland that was the subject of this application included the Coldbrook Estate (Bowden 2008).
- 4.1.4 During 1992 GGAT conducted a Desk Based Assessment for a planning application by Westbury Homes of an area south and west of Penyfal Hospital, Abergavenny (E003693), approximately 300m NNW of the current site. The assessment concluded that the development would have no impact on any known or possible archaeological remains.
- 4.1.5 During 1994 GGAT conducted a Stage 1 archaeological assessment in advance of dualling the A465 between Abergavenny and Hirwaun (GGAT 1994) (E003863; E000959). This was supplemented by a more intensive survey by Cadw. In 1995 The Babtie Group were commissioned to carry out further archaeological studies, based on a brief which required Archaeological Assessments Stage 2 and 3 (E002394). The results of these assessments formed the basis of the cultural Heritage section of the Environmental Statement (Williams 1997; Babtie, 1996). A total of 282 sites were identified and these were previously graded into four categories of importance (A D).

Sites whose grades need confirmation by field evaluations were assigned Grade E. The second phase of the assessment work included a programme of geographical survey or trial trenching of Category E sites. The evaluations enabled a fuller assessment of these sites to be made, and mitigation strategies to be recommended for each of the potentially affected sites (Williams 1997).

- 4.1.18 Reading University and Cotswold Archaeology (Allen et al 2015) undertook a wide ranging and general study of the rural settlement of Roman Britain (GGATE005431). This study has recorded the site of a Romano-British vicus outside the limits of the Roman fort at Abergavenny as well as two urned cremation burials adjacent to a major Roman Road running north from the fort/settlement. It also recorded the Roman Road from Caerleon to the fort at Abergavenny as passing close to the site on the west. However, this is likely to be a result of scale in project mapping. The most likely route for this road would have been closer to the Usk approximately 400m west of the site.
- 4.1.19 There are no borehole data available for the site on the Geology of Britain Viewer website, although there is data available from a series of boreholes dug for Monmouthshire County Council along the line of the Abergavenny Eastern Bypass (A465) immediately to the west of the site (BGS, Geology of Britain Viewer accessed 26/07/2021).

4.2 The Historic Landscape (Figures 4-6)

4.2.1 The proposed development site does not lie within any Registered Historic Landscape. The nearest Registered Landscape of Outstanding Historic Interest lies just over 2km to the SW of the site at *Blaenavon* (Cadw, CCW & ICOMOS 1998; HLW (GT) 1) (Figure 4). The following is an extract from the GGAT/Cadw description of the registered historic landscape:

The whole area is covered by early, coal opencasts and it survives as probably the only sizeable, abandoned, multiple period, opencast mineral working in South Wales. It remains a palimpsest of early mineral working and processing, criss-crossed by shallow trench mines, tramway inclines and tips. These elements, with the town of Blaenavon, Coity Mountain, the Blorenge and Pwll Du, and a preserved mining scenery directly related to the mining processes, form the essence of the unique historic character of the landscape of Blaenavon. Until the late medieval period, the area was primarily used for sheep grazing and it was not until the late 16th and early 17th centuries that any form of settlement associated with iron exploitation appears, although the area was richly endowed with all the requirements for ironmaking, with , woodland, limestone, coal and good quality ironstone available in abundance. Between the 1670s and 1790s iron ore was being exploited on a small scale on lands immediately to the north of the present town, however the large-scale, commercial development of the local mineral wealth only began with the establishment of the Blaenavon Ironworks in 1789.

The landscape of Blaenavon, although subject to reclamation schemes such as at Kays and Kears, remains one of the best preserved, relict industrial landscapes in Wales, containing a vast concentration and diversity of archaeological features. It also serves as one of the most powerful reminders of the Welsh Industrial Revolution, and man's exploitation of, and dramatic impact on, the landscape.

The proposed development site lies over 2km distant from the eastern edge of this registered historic landscape and will not directly impact upon it. Any potential indirect (visual impact) will be negligible since the site is only visible from the very edge of the landscape and the urban area of Abergavenny lies between it and the site.

4.2.2 The site lies within the landmap historic landscape area of East Bergavenny (MNMTHHL049). Landmap areas are not designated landscapes but contain objective and subjective information designed to enable landscape quality to be considered in decision making (Figure 4). The East Bergavenny area comprises a rural environment of regular fieldscapes. Its condition is currently assessed as being of outstanding historic value predominantly displaying outstanding integrity, survival, condition, rarity and considerable potential.

- 4.2.3 In Monmouthshire County Council's Monmouthshire Landscape Sensitivity Update the site falls within two Local Landscape Character Areas: LLCA A19 in the northern part of the site & LLCA A18 in the southern part of the site. LLCA A19 and that part of A18 that lies within the site is assessed as being of moderate historic landscape value (MCC, 2020).
- 4.2.4 The proposed development site does not lie within any Conservation Areas (Figure 5). Two Conservation Areas lie within 3km of the proposed development site, Both Abergavenny Conservation Areas (WAL/MON/16 & WAL/MON/31). Both lie approximately 150m distant from the proposed development site to the north and west. Any indirect visual impact on these Conservation Areas is expected to be minimal due to the intervening railway and A465 trunk road.
- 4.2.5 The site does not lie within any registered Historic Parks & Gardens (Figure 6). Six such registered Parks lie within the 3km search area. The closest is the grade II Registered Park and Garden at Coldbrook House (Gt30) which lies approximately 165m to the south, although it's designated area of essential setting directly borders the southern boundary of the site. Coldbrook House is a landscape park dating from the 18th and 19th centuries, with origins as a medieval deer park. It retains partial remains of 16th/17th-century terraced gardens, early nineteenth-century pleasure grounds, Edwardian terraced gardens and an 18th century walled kitchen garden. The gardens are partially preserved, and the park is well preserved. It has a designated significant view north from the main house which may be indirectly impacted by the proposed development.
- 4.2.6 The remaining 5 registered historic parks and gardens within 3km of the site all lie to the west of the railway and A465 within the urban area of Abergavenny. Their significant views are all directed away from the site and will not impacted either directly or indirectly by the proposed development.

4.3 Scheduled Monuments (Figure 7)

4.3.1 Scheduled Monuments are sites considered to be of national importance and have statutory protection under the Ancient Monuments and Archaeological Areas Act 1979. No Scheduled Monument lies within the boundary of the proposed development area.

- 4.3.2 There are 6 Scheduled Monument within the 3km search area. Three of which lie within 1km of the site, all within the historic urban core of Abergavenny. The closest to the site is the *Area of Conventual Buildings, St Mary's Priory* (MM183), located approximately 535m WNW of the development site. This monument comprises the remains of a medieval priory within the grounds of St Mary's Church, Abergavenny. *Abergavenny Castle* (MM056) lies 600m west of the site and the site of *Abergavenny Roman Fort* (MM193) lies 700m to the west of the site.
- 4.3.3 Two further scheduled monuments dating from the medieval period lie within 3km north of the site. *Abergavenny Bridge* (MM010) lies approximately 1.5km west of the site, and *St. Faith's Churchyard Cross, Llanfoist* (MM306) lies approximately 2.1km WSW of the site.
- 4.3.4 One scheduled monument lying within 3km of the site to the SW dates from the post-Medieval period: *Hill's Tramroad Inclines, Llanfoist* (MM276) is an industrial site associated with the Blaenavon Registered Historic Landscape and located 2.5km SW of the site.
- 4.3.5 The proposed development is not expected to have either a direct or indirect (visual impact) on the setting of any of these scheduled monuments.

4.4 Listed Buildings (Figures 8-9)

- 4.4.1 No listed buildings lie within the boundary of the proposed development area.
- 4.4.2 There are 303 Listed Buildings within the 3km search area around the proposed development site. Of these, 163 lie within 1km of the site, the vast majority of which are within the historic urban core of Abergavenny to the west of the railway and A465 corridor.
- 4.4.3 The closest is a cluster of 4 grade II listed buildings in and around Abergavenny Railway Station that lie between 150m and 200m west of the site. They include Abergavenny Railway Station, including down platform building and footbridge (LB 2472); Telephone Call-box opposite entrance to Abergavenny Railway Station (LB 2802); Great Western Hotel (LB 2471); and Fairlea (LB2755). The main building of Abergavenny Railway Station, on the town side is built of pink semi-ashlar sandstone with natural slate roofs and stone stacks. The secondary building is stone with a timber-framed front and a natural slate roof. The footbridge joining the two is cast and wrought iron and steel. It is listed as a well-preserved railway station of 1854 of definite character, which was designed by Charles Liddell and which has several interesting later additions (Cadw listed Building description). It is expected that the proposed development will not impact on the setting of these listed buildings due to the intervening railway and A465 corridor.
- 4.4.4 A second cluster of seven grade II listed buildings lie between 300m and 450m WNW of the site and are associated with *Parc Pen-y-fal (former main hospital building)* (LB2869). These buildings form part of a former lunatic asylum built between 1847 and 1852. They are Listed for its special interest as one of the best examples in Wales of a 19th century hospital building. These buildings lie 1km outside Abergavenny town centre and to the west of the railway and A465 corridor and will not be impacted by the proposed development.

- 4.4.5 Of the remaining 152 Listed buildings located within 1km of the site 2 are grade I: Church of St Mary (LB 2373); and Abergavenny Castle (ruins) (LB 2376). Six are grade II* and the remaining 144 are all grade II.
- 4.4.6 Of the remaining 144 listed buildings that between 1km and 3km distant from the site one is grade I: *Church of St Teilo* (LB 2002); five are grade II* and the remainder are all grade II.
- 4.5 Known Archaeological Remains and Historical Development (Figure 10; Appendix I)
- 4.5.1 Archaeology Wales commissioned a search of records held on the Glamorgan Gwent Archaeological Trust Historic Environment Record (HER) within 1 km search area of the site under enquiry reference number 6605. The search was completed on 9/8/2021.
- 4.5.2 There are 193 sites listed on the Historic Environment Record (HER) within 1km of the proposed development site, one of which is located within the bounds of site. This is the approximate location of a 16th-17th century pottery kiln site (GGAT03976g). It appears to have been identified through the surface find of a kiln waster from a manganese glazed tyg and numerous other pottery sherds of jugs, platters, etc. Outside of the site, the closest records are mostly associated with 19th century buildings, mills, houses and Farms some standing, others ruined an some lost but known from documentary evidence. The most significant are the chapel (GGAT01341g), house (GGAT01340g) and gardens (GGAT06091g) of Coldbrook House located approximately 600-800m SSW of the site. The site of a former water mill is also recorded 270m west of Coldbrook House. Other nearby records include the findspot of a flint flake from Skirrid Fach (GGAT05638g) 700m east of the site; a modern Gorsedd stone circle measuring 20m in diameter (GGAT01349g) and the line of the Roman Road from Caerleon to Abergavenny Roman Fort (RR62a-03) both approximately 400m west of the site.
- 4.5.3 32 records of findspots are recorded on the Portable Antiquities Scheme database (www.finds.org.uk) within 1km of post code NP7 9SL. These include the findspot of a medieval harness pendant (PAS UID: NMGW-5229D4) and 31 Roman Coins.
- 4.5.4 The recorded archaeological sites are briefly described below, according to period, where they are incorporated into a summary of the historical development of the area.
 - Prehistoric: Palaeolithic (c.450,000 10,000 BC), Mesolithic (c.10,000 4400 BC), Neolithic (4400 BC 2300 BC), Bronze Age (2300 BC 700 BC) & Iron Age (700 BC AD 43)
- 4.5.5 There is little evidence of prehistoric activity within the proposed development site. However, several late prehistoric sites are recorded within the 1km search area.
 - The earliest datable evidence for prehistoric activity in the study area dates from the Neolithic period represented by the find spot of a single sherd of Neolithic pottery and some flints as well as Iron age ceramic were found during excavation works from Flannel Street in Abergavenny (03277g) approximately 800m WNW of the site. The findspot of a prehistoric flint flake is also recorded for Ysgyryd Fach, 670m east of the site and Bronze Age or Neolithic flints were recovered during excavations at a Sewerage Works 1km west of the site.

A series of aerial photos taken during March 2012 by the Royal Commission has recorded the hill of Little Skirrid, 500m east of the site, following forestry clearance. *At the west end the hill ends in a blunt promontory defined by an artificial scarp or rampart around the north, west and south sides of a small, defended enclosure measuring approx. 60m x 50m. Lower down on the northern and southern sides of the slopes, feint terracing may mark the original line of a much larger denuded earthwork enclosure measuring some 260m east-west x 105m north-south, a considerable size. It is thought that these earthworks may mark the site of a previously unknown Iron Age promontory fort, although, the lack of neatly-built multivallate defences and the coincidence of a flint find (05638g) may point to a Later Bronze Age or Neolithic date for the enclosure (Coflein NPRN 420979).*

Given that the proposed development area lies at least 500m distant from any known Prehistoric site, and find spot, the potential for archaeological remains, dating from the Prehistoric period is considered to be low.

Roman (AD 43 - c. AD 410)

There are no archaeological sites dating from the Romano-British period recorded within the proposed development site. However, there are 21 Romano-British sites recorded within the 1km search area. The most significant is the scheduled monument of Abergavenny Roman Fort (MM193; 01761g) located 700m east of the site on the north bank of the Usk in the centre of Abergavenny and close to the medieval castle. The remains are now mostly under the Castle Street Car Park. It is thought to have been built in AD 55 to house the 500 strong cavalry unit of the legion based at Usk (and later Caerleon), evidence points to it being destroyed or dismantled in AD 60 before being either refurbished or rebuilt in AD 68. The fort was occupied well into the 3rd century, although a garrison may not have been continuously present. The construction of a building across the ramparts at some stage in the later 3rd century seems to herald the demise of the fort (Orchard Site; Building R3). Late Roman (presumably civilian) occupation continued in some form until at least the close of the 4th century, but its character and extent is not known in any detail. The fort was situated on high ground, close to the edge of a sharp slope that falls away southwards to the floodplain of the River Usk and close to its confluence with the River Gavenny forming a naturally defendable site that may also have been occupied in the prehistoric period. Two probable stretches of Roman defences have been located. Other significant features have been excavated including barracks, granaries, and a stretch of intervallum road. Findspots of Roman material outside the defended area of the Roman fort in the area to the east and south of Flannel Steet, provide an indication of the whereabouts of an associated civilian vicus settlement (10975g). However, it is not clear whether this activity took place within a defended annexe of the fort or whether it represents a true extra mural civilian settlement (Pearson 2002, 10-12). Three Roman Roads have been identified as leading to and from the fort, The first is the road approaching from the Legionary fortress at Caerleon, along the Usk valley (RR62a-03). The second continued west up the Usk valley from the fort towards Brecon (RR62a-02). The third may have headed north towards Hereford. Two urned cremation burials were excavated near a major road c 800m north of the fort. This is thought to represent a Roman road to Kenchester (near Hereford) that ran close to the present line of the Abergavenny-Hereford Road. The pottery was dated to c AD 60 suggesting the burials were contemporary with military activity (01375Gg). There were

also previous discoveries of cremation burials along the Hereford Road and so it is likely that forms part of a cemetery (01370g).

The closest find spot of Romano-British material to the site lies 500m to the WNW and consists of a coin: an Antoninianus of Gallienus, issued AD 260 - 268. found in the chest tomb of Sir laurence Hastings in the Herbert Chapel of Abergavenny Priory (04877g).

Given that the proposed development area lies at least 700m distant from any known Roman settlement site, and 400m distant from the nearest known Roman Road, the potential for archaeological remains, dating from the Romano-British period is considered to be low.

Early Medieval (c. AD 410 - AD 1086) & Medieval (1086 - 1536)

- 4.5.7 There are no records of early medieval archaeological activity within the proposed development site. Neither are there any specifically early medieval sites recorded on the HER within the 1km search area. Nevertheless, the fact that the Norman Castle at Abergavenny was built adjacent to the site of the former Roman fort may suggest that settlement in some form had continued at Abergavenny from the 5th to 11th centuries AD. However, the site of the Norman Castle, located between the River Gavenny and The Usk was easily defendable and may have encouraged episodic occupation and reoccupation without continuous settlement. It has been suggested that the presence of a holy well *Ffynnon y Garreg* (01332g; 03282g) near St Mary's priory church at Abergavenny, 500m west of the site, may indicate that this ecclesiastical site has an early medieval origin (Evans, 2003, 44).
- 4.5.8 There are also 27 sites dating from the medieval period recorded on the HER within the 1km search area. These generally relate to archaeological and upstanding structural remains within the historic core of Abergavenny. The most significant sites are the scheduled Monuments: Area of Conventual Buildings, St Mary's Priory (MM183), located approximately 535m WNW of the proposed candidate site. This monument comprises the remains of a medieval priory within the grounds of St Mary's Church, Abergavenny; and Abergavenny Castle (MM056) which lies 600m west of the site. The Castle comprises the remains of an important medieval baronial castle with stone buildings of the 13th to 15th centuries and later post medieval alterations associated with an early 19th century shooting box and a public park. It originated as an earth and timber motte and bailey utilising the same ridge as the Roman fort and was probably established by Hamelin de Ballon in 1087 following the initial Norman incursions into the Welsh kingdoms of Gwent and Brycheiniog. Abergavenny formed the administrative centre of its own Marcher lordship encapsulating the lowlands of the middle Usk Valley and large tracts of mountainous terrain to the north and west. The castle was soon accompanied by the other key economic and religious elements of Norman colonisation to a scale befitting the status and aspirations of its founders in the form of a defended borough on the ridge along the ridge to the north, which was enclosed by stone walls and gates by the start of the 14th century, and the Benedictine priory outside of the walled area to the south-east (Cadw Scheduled Monument Description, MM056).

Two further scheduled monuments dating from the medieval period lie within 3km of the site: Abergavenny Bridge (MM010) lies approximately 1.5km west of the site, and

St. Faith's Churchyard Cross, Llanfoist (MM306) lies approximately 2.1km WSW of the site.

Three mills (01329g; 01330g; 01331g) at Abergavenny are mentioned in the minister's accounts for the year 1256-7 (South Wales 7 Monmouth Record Society 1950-9). The location of three mills are shown on the OS 1st edition County Series mapping, but they are not shown on earlier maps indicating that The location of the medieval mills is not certain. The position of one (01331g) is shown on the HER is being possibly located 55m west of the proposed candidate site. However, this appears to be the result of a typographical error as the report associated with this site gives a different location 450m further west.

The Chapel at Coldbrook House is said to have been an old chapel, potentially of medieval or early medieval origin. It was last mentioned in 1702, on what in 1907, was the site of a ruined grotto (01341q).

It is interesting to note that a deep holloway bisects the southern part of the proposed candidate site. This represents the line of an old road that had gone out of use by the mid-19th century and was referred to as an 'old road' on the Tithe map at that time. The OS 1st Series map of 1832 shows it as an extant road at that slightly earlier time, albeit already potentially diverted above the deepest part of the hollow. This Holloway cuts diagonally across the prevailing orientation of the field boundaries in the site which are generally aligned WSW-ENE. The relationship between the orientation of the western part of the former road and the field boundaries suggests that the field boundaries may pre-date the 'old road' at least in part. The south-eastern section of the old road is aligned approximately perpendicular to the prevailing field alignments and may be contemporary with them. This suggests that the field boundaries must predate 1832 and are more likely to be medieval or earlier in origin. LiDAR imagery suggests that fait traces of medieval ridge and furrow cultivation earthworks may survive within the fields on the upper, eastern side of the site.

Given that the proposed development area lies at least 500m distant from any known medieval settlement site, on west facing pastoral slopes, the potential for archaeological remains, other than cultivation and field boundary earthworks, dating from the medieval or early medieval periods is considered to be low.

Post-Medieval (1536 – 1899) & Modern (1900 – present day)

4.5.9 There is one site dating from the Post-Medieval period recorded within the proposed candidate site listed on the HER. This is the possible location of a 16th-17th century pottery kiln site (03976g) in the southern part of the site close to the holloway which bisects the southern part of the site at NGR SO30921340. The location has been identified from surface finds including the kiln waster of a manganese glazed tyg and numerous pottery sherds of jugs, platters, etc.

There are a further118 sites listed on the HER within the 1km search area. The vast majority of these relate to buildings within the historic core of Abergavenny. The closest to the site include the gardens and buildings associated with Larchfield House, 200m-250m north of the site. Larchfield House is a substantial mid-late 19th century gothic revival residence (11096g) with stable (11095g), gardens (11099g) and garden boundary (11097g). There is also a small group of monuments associated with Coldbrook House (01340g), gardens (06091g) and Mill (01348g). The gardens form

part of the Registered Historic Park and Gardens of Coldbrook House which date from the medieval period to the early twentieth century. The gardens are partially preserved, and the park is well preserved.

19th century maps indicate that almost the entire site was occupied by pasture fields, some bounded by hedge banks which could potentially pre-date the post-medieval period. There was a single farm on the site of the current Roc House Farm which was demolished in the late 20th century and replaced with the current building. The Holloway which bisects the southern part of the site is referred to as the 'Old Road' on the tithe map of 1843 but was still shown as a road on the OS 1st series map of 1832. The depth of the Holloway has been enhanced by a small stream running along its bottom, although it is nevertheless likely to have a medieval origin.

The potential for archaeological remains, dating from the Post Medieval period being preserved within the site are generally low, although this is enhanced in the area of the possible 16th-17th century pottery Kiln and in the area of Roc House Farm.

5 Map Regression (Figures 11-14)

5.1 Ordnance Survey First Series map of 1832 (sheet 42) originally printed at 1:63360 (Figure 11)

This is the earliest readily available map that shows the site prior to the construction of the railway. A tramway is shown running around Abergavenny town to the north and west. This is the Llanfihangel Railway (opened 1812) which linked Govilon to Llanvihangel via Abergavenny and was one of a number of tramroads which the railway later bought out (GGAT 05954g). The area of the proposed candidate site is comprised of enclosed fields located on the western slopes of Skirrid Fach between 2 farms, the eastern of which is called Skirrid Farm. This situation is shown in more detail on the slightly later but more detailed Tithe Map below. The track which bisects the southern part of the site is clearly shown as a road linking Abergavenny to Pen-y-Parc. This road is described as 'Old Road' on the Tithe Map of 1843 and is today represented by a deep Holloway with a stream running through it.

5.2 Tithe maps: Plan of the Parish of Abergavenny in the County of Monmouth, 1843; (Figure 12)

5.2.1 The site fell within the Parish of Abergavenny during the mid-19th century and extended over 15 individual plots. The majority of these fields are recorded as being owned by The Earl of Abergavenny and formed part of a single Farm, which was occupied by James Wheeler. This farm is not named on the Tithe Apportionment but can today be equated with Roc House Farm. All of the fields associated with this farm are listed as being cultivated as grass, presumably pasture, at the time of the Tithe Map. The southern part of the site, south of and including the old road from Abergavenny to Pen-y-Parc, as well as some of the eastern fringes of the site, were owned by Ferdinand Hanbury-Williams of Coldbrook Park (1799-1886) and farmed by a variety of tennants. The majority of the land was cultivated as grass apart from the old road from Abergavenny to Pen-y-Parc which was woodland, and the southernmost field which was arable.

5.3 Ordnance Survey County Series, Monmouthshire, 1881 edition, originally printed at 1:2,500

This detailed Ordnance Survey map of the later 19th century shows the Newport, Abergavenny and Hereford Railway which was opened in 1853 along the line of the current railway. By 1863 it had become part of the Great Western Railway. Abergavenny station is also shown along with associated infrastructure and industry such as goods sheds, timber yard and hotel. Otherwise, there is little discernible change from the time of the Tithe Map within the site itself, other than some subdivision of fields into smaller paddocks. The buildings at Roc House Farm appear to have been demolished and re-built on the same site but with a different alignment. The old road bisecting the southern part of the site has been truncated by the railway and diverted north along the line to a new underpass adjacent to the station. The large house *Cae Derwen* located just outside the site to the NE was built by the time of this map. *Skirrid Farm*, as recorded on the OS 1st Series map of 1832 (Figure 11) had changed its name to *Nag Farm*.

5.4 Ordnance Survey County Series 1st Edition, Monmouthshire, 1886 edition, originally printed at 1:10,560 (Figure 13)

This smaller scale map does not have the same detail as the map above, but it does show that there has been little discernible change in the intervening five years.

5.5 Ordnance Survey County Series 2nd Edition, Monmouthshire, 1901 edition, originally printed at 1:2,500

This map shows that there had been little discernible change since the 1881 edition, although two new outbuildings have been constructed at Roc House Farm and a well

house has been constructed at a spring in the NW corner of the site, with a further small field barn in a neighbouring field to its east.

5.6 Ordnance Survey County Series, Monmouthshire, 1920 edition, originally printed at 1:2,500

This detailed map shows that the well house in the NW corner of the site, and one of the outbuildings at Roc House Farm appear to be in a ruinous condition. However, the field barn to the east of the well house is now within a separate small paddock with associated structures.

- 5.7 Ordnance Survey County Series, Monmouthshire, 1922 edition, originally printed at 1:10,560
 - Only the southern part of the site is visible on this map in which there is no discernible change.
- 5.8 Ordnance Survey County Series, Brecknockshire, 1922 edition, originally printed at 1:10,560
 Only the northern part of the site is visible on this map. No discernible change
- 5.9 Ordnance Survey County Series, Monmouthshire, 1938-53 edition, originally printed at 1:10,560

 No discernible change
- 5.10 Ordnance Survey Plan 1964 edition, originally printed at 1:10,560 No discernible change within the site. The A465 Heads of the Valleys Road is under construction to the south of Abergavenny.
- 5.11 Ordnance Survey Plan 1965 edition, originally printed at 1:2,500

 No discernible change other than a new outbuilding has been added to the east of the Roc House Farm buildings and a new field barn has been constructed in the paddock to the north. The field barn east of the spring in the NW part of the site has been demolished and re-built on a larger scale. Outside of the site, to the west of the railway, a modern housing estate has been constructed at Holywell and Belmont Crescents.
- 5.12 Ordnance Survey Plan 1977 edition, originally printed at 1:10,000 (Figure 14)

 No discernible change on the site, although the A465 is under construction running north on the east side of the railway, outside but bordering the site to the west.
- 5.13 Ordnance Survey Plan 1986 edition, originally printed at 1:2,500
 No discernible change other than the old Roc House Farmhouse and outbuildings have been demolished and replaced by a large single building with square plan, slightly to the north of the old farmhouse.

6 Aerial Photographs and Lidar (Figure 15-16)

- 6.1 Aerial Photos
- 6.1.1 The Central Register for Air Photography for Wales (CRAPW) is currently in the process of being transferred to the RCAMHW. It is not possible to access this collection currently. A small number of oblique aerial photographs are available to view through the Britain from Above Project (https://britainfromabove.org.uk/) which have partial views of the site. WAW023907 WALES (1949). View of Maindiff farm and nursery

shows the eastern edge of the site for example, and *WPW039965 WALES* (1932). General view of Abergavenny, oblique aerial view shows the western edge, although no archaeological features are discernible on either.

Photographs of the site available on the Coflein website (https://coflein.gov.uk/en/ - accessed 18/06/21) provide further partial views. Black and white oblique aerial photograph showing Abergavenny, from Aerofilms album Monmouth A-Ce (444), taken by Aerofilms Ltd and dated 1963 (Coflein Archive No. 6323086) shows the NE corner of the site for example.

- 6.1.2 A search for Aerial photographs held at The Cambridge University Collection of Aerial Photography (CUCAP) was undertaken. This indicates that there are eight aerial photographs of the site dating from the 1950's onwards available in the collections. However, many of these are of Abergavenny and its environs, none clearly show the site. The full Cambridge collection is unfortunately not available for consultation currently.
- 6.1.3 Historic imagery is also available on Google Earth from 2004. However, no archaeological features are visible on the site. The image does show that fields either side of the 'old road' at the southern end of the site have been utilised as arable on occasion in the past. These images also show that a new farmhouse was constructed between 1988 and 2004 at Roc House Farm, to the south of the square barn noted on OS mapping.

6.2 Lidar (Figures 15-16)

6.2.1 Lidar data at 2m DTM is available for the site area (Figures 15-16). It is clear that the majority of the field boundaries on site include hedge banks often accompanied by ditches. The major feature observable is the Holloway cutting across the south end of the site which represents the line of the old Road from Abergavenny to Pen-y-Parc. This road is shown on the OS 1st series map of 1833 and is referred to as an 'Old Road' on the 1843 Abergavenny Tithe Map. The steepness of the sides and narrowness of the Holloway meant that it was not cultivable and only useful as woodland during the mid-19th century. Today it has a stream flowing through it. Some of the fields on tee stern side of the sit and to the south of the Holloway contain faint traces of parallel E-W aligned ridges suggestive of the remains of medieval ridge and furrow cultivation.

7 Site Visit (Figures 17-18; Plates 1 – 39)

- 7.1 A site visit was undertaken on the 16th of August 2021 by Dan Moore (ACIfA) of Archaeology Wales. Conditions were dry and cloudy with good visibility.
- 7.2 The site is an irregular elongated sub-rectangular shape in plan and covers an area of approximately 24.8 hectares. It comprises 15 fields and partial fields. It lies east of the A465 on a west facing slope at the foot of Ysgyryd Fach between the 120m and 80m contours. It is partly bounded on the northwest by the A465, to the northeast, by land associated with the properties of Caederwen and Garth Farm, to the east by land associated with Little Skirrid, and to the south and west by agricultural fields. The site lies approximately 150m east of Abergavenny rail station and 1km ESE of the historic core of Abergavenny. For the purposes of this report the fields have been numbered

- F1-F15 and shown on the photo Location Plan (Figure 17). All fields are currently used as pasture or meadow except for the Holloway (F14) which is woodland. Field boundaries tend to be ditched with grown out mature tree hedgerows and modern post and wire fences.
- 7.3 Field 1: is in the NE quadrant of the site and is approximately rectangular in plan with maximum dimensions of 190m x 65m. It comprises a closely cropped rough pasture field sloping from east to west (plate 1) and bounded by a hedge and ditch on the north (plate 2), south and east sides (plate 3), a gravel track on the west side (plate 4). No archaeological features other than the field boundary ditches were observed. Slight undulations in the ground appear to be the result of former watercourses (plate 1). Cartographic evidence suggests that the track and northern boundary ditch were established between 1843 and 1886, whereas the eastern and southern boundaries may predate 1843. All boundary ditches are likely to have been de-silted and altered on a regular basis since their inception.
- 7.4 Field 2: is in the far NE of the site and is approximately triangular in plan with maximum dimensions of 70m x 65m. It comprises a closely cropped rough pasture field sloping from east to west (plates 5 & 6). No archaeological features other than the field boundary ditch on the south side (plate 2) were observed. Cartographic evidence suggests that this field formed a single large field together with Field 1 in 1843 but was subdivided from it by 1886. It was reduced in size in the late 20th century when the A465 was constructed across its NW corner.
- 7.5 Field 3: is the northernmost field of the site and is approximately rectangular in plan with maximum dimensions of 70m x 230m. It comprises a pasture field sloping from east to west (plate 7). A barrel roofed barn and modern blockwork outbuilding are located in the SW corner of the field (plate 8). Agricultural outbuildings were first recorded in this part of the site in 1901 and have been altered on a regular basis. The current barn dates from c.1965 and the modern outbuilding from the 1980s. Cartographic evidence suggests that this field's boundaries are unaltered since 1843.
- 7.6 Field 4: is located south of Field 3 and is approximately rectangular in plan with maximum dimensions of 115m x 235m. It comprises a rough pasture field sloping from east to west (plate 9). The field contains a series of widely spaced very slight linear earthwork banks running parallel to the long ENE-WSW axis of the field (plate 10), which are also visible on the LiDAR imagery of the site (Figure 15). They are presumed to be agricultural in origin, although it is not clear whether they represent former field boundaries (pre-dating 1843) or the remains of former cultivation ridges. Cartographic evidence suggests that this field's boundaries are unaltered since 1843.
- 7.7 Field 5: is located south of Field 4 and is approximately rectangular in plan with maximum dimensions of 120m x 200m. It comprises an improved pasture field sloping from east to west with views towards Abergavenny Town Hall (plate 11). No archaeological features were observed. Cartographic evidence suggests that this field's boundaries are unaltered since 1843.
- 7.8 Field 6: is located east and upslope of Field 5. It is approximately rectangular in plan with maximum dimensions of 150m x 95m, although only the western half of the field falls within the red line boundary of the proposed development site. It comprises a rough pasture field sloping steeply from east to west with views towards Abergavenny Town Hall (plate 12). No archaeological features were observed. Cartographic

- evidence suggests that this field's boundaries are unaltered since 1843, although the area occupied by the Garth Farm buildings (outside of the site at the NW corner of the field) has increased over time.
- 7.9 Field 7: is located south of Fields 1 and 5 and is approximately rectangular in plan with maximum dimensions of 120m x 280m. It comprises an improved pasture field sloping from east to west with views towards Llanfoist (plate 13). Views towards Ysgyryd Fach are obscured by mature tree cover (plate 14). No archaeological features were observed. Cartographic evidence suggests that this field's boundaries are unaltered since 1843. The southern boundary of this field is formed by a deep ditch that contains a small watercourse (plate 15).
- 7.10 Field 8: is located south of Field 7 and is approximately rectangular in plan with maximum dimensions of 150m x 160m. It comprises an improved pasture field sloping from east to west with views towards Llanfoist (plate 16) and Abergavenny Town Hall (plate 17). Views towards Ysgyryd Fach are obscured by mature tree cover (plate 18). No archaeological features were observed, although LiDAR imagery suggests that there may be very faint earthwork remains of ridge and furrow running ENE-WSW in this field. Cartographic evidence suggests that this field's boundaries are unaltered since 1843. The southern boundary of this field is formed by a deep ditch that contains a small watercourse (plate 19).
- 7.11 Field 9: is located south of Field 8 and is approximately tapezoid in plan with maximum dimensions of 150m x 140m. It comprises an improved pasture field sloping from east to west with views towards Llanfoist (plate 20) and Abergavenny Town Hall (plate 21). Views towards Ysgyryd Fach are obscured by mature tree cover (plate 22). No archaeological features were observed, although LiDAR imagery suggests that there may be very faint earthwork remains of ridge and furrow running ENE-WSW in this field. Cartographic evidence suggests that this field's boundaries are unaltered since 1843. A recent cutting has been made in the eastern boundary of this field for a new access gate and ramp (plate 22).
- 7.12 Field 10: is located west of Field 9 and is approximately rectangular in plan with maximum dimensions of 90m x 145m. It comprises an improved pasture field sloping from east to west with views restricted towards Llanfoist (plate 23) and Abergavenny Town (plate 24) due to intervening topography and mature tree cover. No archaeological features were observed. Cartographic evidence suggests that this field's boundaries are unaltered since 1843. LiDAR imagery suggests that the boundaries of this field comprise low hedge banks, although these were not observable on the ground due to thick vegetation cover.
- 7.13 Field 11: is located north of Field 10 and is approximately 'L-shaped in plan with maximum dimensions of 120m x 155m. It comprises an improved pasture field sloping from east to west with views restricted towards Llanfoist (plate 25) and Abergavenny Town (plate 26) due to intervening topography and mature tree cover. No archaeological features were observed. Cartographic evidence suggests that this field's boundaries are largely unaltered since 1843, although a small plot has been separated from the NW corner to accommodate the modern Roc Farm House (plate 25). LiDAR imagery suggests that the eastern and southern boundaries of this field comprise low hedge banks, although these were not observable on the ground due to thick vegetation cover.

- 7.14 Field 12: is located west of and behind the modern Roc House Farm Building and its associated barn. It is elongated in plan with maximum dimensions of 130m x 55m. It comprises a small pasture field or paddock generally sloping from east to west but with large modern earthwork landforms forming the platforms for the farm house and barns to the east. There is also another significant landform in the centre of the plot (Plates 27-8). This mound is in the approximate location of the original farmhouse which is shown on the Tithe map of 1843 but was demolished and rebuilt on a new alignment, on the same site, by the time of the 1st edition OS county series map of 1881. However, the scale of the mound might suggest that it is related to large scale earth movements associated with the construction of the modern farm house. If this is the case, this mound may be protecting remains of the earlier phases of farm buildings beneath.
- 7.15 Field 13: is located south of Fields 9 and 10 and is approximately triangular in plan with maximum dimensions of 195m x 155m. It comprises an improved pasture field sloping from east to west with views restricted towards Llanfoist (plate 29) and Abergavenny Town (plate 30) due to intervening topography and mature tree cover. A series of parallel linear breaks of slope or lynchets were observed aligned N-S with the contours of the slope. These are interpreted as the earthwork remains of former agricultural lynchets (plate 31). Cartographic evidence suggests that this field's boundaries are unaltered since 1843 indicating that these lynchets are likely predate 1843 and may be related to medieval cultivation. LiDAR imagery has not picked up the lynchets, perhaps because they run parallel to the contours. A modern post and wire fence now subdivides the field at the eastern end. This modern fence coincides with a further lynchet, which is likely to be of earlier origin (plate 32).
- Field 14: is located south of field 13 and is curvilinear in plan with maximum dimensions 7.16 of 190m x 25m within the bounds of the site. It is a deep ravine or Holloway marking the divide between fields 13 and 15, now occupied by woodland and with a small stream at its base (plate 33). A public footpath now traverses the ravine, crossing the lowest point at the stream bed, with a footbridge (plate 34). Historic mapping indicates that this Holloway originally formed as a road to Abergavenny from the east and is shown as such on the OS 1st series map of 1832. The tithe map of 1843 refers to it as the 'old road' and records it as woodland. By the time of the OS 1st edition County Series map of 1881, its route is still followed by a track, although that track ran along the top of the ravine, rather than along the base. Its alignment in the south and eastern part approximately follows the dominant alignment of the extant field boundaries, however, to the west it cuts diagonally across the dominant field alignments suggesting that the fields, in the most part, predate the 'old road'. This further suggests that the stream is likely not to have originally followed, the line of the 'old road', but diverted later when the Holloway became deep enough.
- 7.17 Field 15: is the only field to lie south of the Holloway. It is trapezoidal in plan with maximum dimensions of 260m x 195m. It comprises an improved pasture field sloping from east to west with views towards Llanfoist (plate 35). The possible site of a 16th-17th century pottery kiln is recorded on the Historic Environment Record for this field, although no trace of it was observed on the ground. A series of faint parallel linear earthwork banks were observed aligned E-W across the contours of the slope. These are interpreted as the earthwork remains of former cultivation ridges, potentially

- medieval ridge and furrow (plate 36). Cartographic evidence suggests that this field's boundaries are unaltered since 1843. The field was cultivated as arable at that time.
- 7.18 Key historic assets (Listed Buildings, Registered Historic Landscapes, Historic Parks and Gardens, Conservation Areas and Scheduled monuments) were visited to assess the visual impact of the proposed development on the surrounding landscape. Those closest to the site are listed below. The closest listed building to the site comprises the grade II listed Abergavenny Railway Station, including down platform building and footbridge (LB 2472); which lies approximately 150m west of the proposed development site on the opposite side of the A465. Views towards the site are completely obscured due to intervening mature tree cover (plate 37).
- 7.19 Accessible points around the perimeter of the nearest Registered Historic Park and Garden, the grade II listed Coldbrook House Park (Gt30), were visited. The site was not clearly visible, obscured by intervening mature tree cover and topography (plate 38).
- 7.20 A second cluster of seven grade II listed buildings lying between 300m and 450m WNW of the site and are associated with Parc Pen-y-fal (former main hospital building) (LB2869) were visited. The site is completely obscured from view from these buildings due to intervening topography and tree cover (plate 39). All other designated heritage assets are more distant from the site, many within Abergavenny town centre, and do not have clear views towards it.
- 7.21 The central Abergavenny Conservation Area (WAL/MON/16), and some associated listed buildings are visible from the upper parts of the site only. This includes the upper part of the tower at the grade II listed Abergavenny Town Hall (LB2416). Views towards the site from ground level within the Conservation Area are largely obstructed by intervening urban landscape and mature trees. Furthermore, it is understood that the upper part of the site will be characterised by lower density housing and increased levels of Green Infrastructure (Figure 2) and any impact on the setting of the Conservation Area is expected to be negligible. Scheduled Monuments within the historic core of Abergavenny and not clearly visible from even the elevated parts of the site. The village of Llanfoist is also visible from the upper and southern parts of the site. However, at 2km distance, and given the Green Infrastructure mitigation measures in place, individual listed buildings in Llanfoist will not be impacted by the development.

8 Impact Assessment

8.1 Assessment of Archaeological Potential and Importance

8.1.1 As laid out in Section 4.5, There is a low potential for archaeological remains for all periods, other than medieval agricultural earthworks and two specific Post Medieval sites, to occur within the proposed development site. For the post medieval period the areas of higher potential can be identified as the possible location of the 16th-17th century pottery kilns and the area of Roc House Farm. The position and condition of potential remains of the putative pottery kilns are not known. The site was identified through the chance surface discovery of a kiln waster. Nevertheless, these remains have the potential to be of medium (regional) importance in helping to understand and accurately date late medieval and post medieval regional ceramic type series'.

Any surviving remains of the former farm buildings on the site of Roc House Farm are likely to be of low (local) importance, as are the medieval agricultural earthworks.

8.2 Previous Impacts

8.2.1 No significant previous impacts on the sub-surface archaeological potential of the site have been identified. Most of the fields appear to have been cultivated as pasture during the 19th and 20th centuries apart from those in the southern part of the site which appear to have been episodically cultivated as arable. LiDAR data suggests that there may be the slight remains of medieval ridge and furrow cultivation earthworks oriented approximately E-W, in some of the eastern fields.

8.3 Potential Impacts of the Proposed Development

- 8.3.1 The proposed development is a candidate site for inclusion in the updated local development plan. As such no firm planning proposals have yet been submitted. Nevertheless, it is understood that the proposed development is likely to comprise the construction of approximately 600 residential units, the option of a 1 hectare school site, an allocated employment area/mixed use site, retail units arranged around a community square, hospitality units, park and ride, green infrastructure corridors and other associated infrastructure such as roads, cycleways, footpaths and bridges. It is also understood that there is provision for low density housing in the elevated sections of the site and additional green infrstructure outside of the site to the east to lessen the visual impact from Ysgyryd Fach and Coldbrook House Park. Any of the following activities associated with the proposed development could therefore expose, damage or destroy archaeological remains:
 - Enabling works, such as the installation of the contractor's compound, construction of access roads, parking areas, storage areas, borrow pits and associated services.
 - Landscaping and terracing works.
 - Surface stripping and levelling.
 - Construction of roads, parking and infrastructure.
 - Foundation excavations.
 - Deep excavations for ponds and other drainage/cooling/sprinkler system works.
 - Service installation.
 - Excavation of berms/ditches as vehicle mitigation.
 - Any other ground disturbing work.

Historic Landscapes

- 8.3.2 The proposed development site does not lie within any Registered Landscape of Outstanding Historic Interest and no such landscape will be either directly or indirectly affected by the proposals. The site lies more than 2km NE of the eastern edge of the Blaenavon Landscape of Outstanding Historic Interest (HLW (GT) 1).
- 8.3.3 No Conservation Area will be directly or indirectly affected by the proposed development. The site lies approximately 150m from the closest part of the Conservation Area at Abergavenny (WAL/MON/16). However, the site is screened from the station by intervening mature trees, the A465 corridor and the Railway. The upper parts of some listed buildings within the historic core of Abergavenny are visible from the upper parts of the upper fields only. The site is not clearly visible at ground level

within the central part of the Conservation Area and any minimal impact is expected to be mitigated by additional Green Infrastructure measures in the upper part of the site.

8.3.4 No registered Historic Park & Garden will be directly affected by the proposed development. The site lies approximately 170m from the nearest Registered Historic Park and Garden, the grade II listed Coldbrook House Park (Gt30). Furthermore, the essential setting of this park adjoins the southern boundary of the site. There is also a significant view from the park towards the SE corner of the site recorded in the listing. Unmitigated it is considered that the development would have a moderate indirect (visual) impact on the setting of this registered historic asset. However, it is understood that extra Green Infrastructure measures will be included in the proposals to mitigate against this. Furthermore, large sections of the historic park are already effectively screened from the site through intervening mature woodland, topography and hedgerows. With the additional GI measures in place along the southern site boundary, it is considered that the impact of the development on the Registered Historic Park of Coldbrook House will be minor.

Scheduled Monuments

- 8.3.6 No Scheduled Monument (SM) will be directly or indirectly affected by the proposed development.
- 8.3.7 There are 6 Scheduled Monuments within the 3km search area. The closest to the site is the *Area of Conventual Buildings, St Mary's Priory* (MM183), located approximately 535m WNW of the development site; *Abergavenny Castle* (MM056) lies 600m west of the site; and the site of *Abergavenny Roman Fort* (MM193) lies 700m to the west of the site. Views to the site from these monuments are obscured by intervening urban landscape and mature tree cover.

All other monuments lie further away and will not by impacted directly or indirectly by the development.

Listed Buildings

- 8.3.8 No listed buildings will be directly or indirectly affected by the proposed development.
- 8.3.9 There are 303 Listed Buildings within the 3km search area around the proposed development site. Of these, 163 lie within 1km of the site, the vast majority of which lie within the historic urban core of Abergavenny to the west of the railway and A465 corridor. The closest to the site is a cluster of 4 grade II listed buildings in and around Abergavenny Railway Station that lie between 150m and 200m west of the site. They include Abergavenny Railway Station, including down platform building and footbridge (LB 2472); Telephone Call-box opposite entrance to Abergavenny Railway Station (LB 2802); Great Western Hotel (LB 2471); and Fairlea (LB2755).

It is considered that the development will have no visual or other indirect impact on the character or setting of these listed buildings. The site is screened from view by the intervening A465 corridor including a belt of mature trees. Whilst the tower of Abergavenny Town Hall is visible from the elevated parts of the site, the site is obscured at ground level through the intervening urban townscape.

Non-designated Archaeological Sites

8.3.10 There are two sites of potential archaeological interest identified within the bounds of the proposed development area: The first is the possible location of a 16th-17th century pottery kiln site (03976g) in the southern part of the site at NGR SO30921340. The location and nature of any potential sub-surface archaeological remains associated with this site are at present unknown. However, any remains that do survive will have the potential to contain evidence of Medium (regional) value which will further our understanding of late medieval and post medieval ceramic type series in the region. These remains, if they exist on the site, may be directly impacted by the proposed development. The overall impact is assessed as moderate.

The second is the location of the former 19th century farmhouse on the site of Roc House Farm, demolished during the late 20th century (LEA001). The date of origin of this farm stead is unknown and the condition of any potential sub-surface archaeological remains is also unknown. The development may have a direct impact on these remains which are assessed as being of low (local) importance indicating that the overall impact will be minor.

8.3.11 The only other known potential archaeological remains of interest on the site are the faint remains of ridge and furrow earthworks and lynchets (LEA002). Their date of formation is known to pre-date the Tithe Map of 1843 and could be medieval or earlier in origin. The proposed development is likely to have a significant impact on these remains which are of low (local) interest.

9 Conclusions

9.1 Impacts on Designated Assets

- 9.1.1 No Conservation Area, scheduled monument, listed building or Historic Landscape of Outstanding Historic Interest will be directly or indirectly affected by the proposed development.
- 9.1.2 The site borders the northern boundary of the essential setting of the grade II Coldbrook House Registered Historic Park & Garden (Gt3). The proposed development will potentially have an indirect (visual) impact on the setting of this registered heritage asset. However, plans to enhance the green infrastructure along the southern boundary of the site should ensure that any such impact will be minor.
- 9.1.3 The site also contains the potential subsurface remains of a 16th-17th century pottery kiln of medium (regional) value. Because there is currently some uncertainty concerning the location, depth and survival of archaeological deposits associated with the kilns on the site, it is likely that the archaeological advisors to the LPA will request a phased approach to archaeological mitigation, although any decision in this regard will be dependent and based upon the final proposed development plans as submitted to the LPA. The possible phased mitigation could comprise a geophysical survey in the first instance. The results of this would enable a better understand the survival and depth of the archaeological resource. This first phase of mitigation is likely to cover

the entire site area. The survey could be followed by an archaeological trenched evaluation which might entail the excavation of trenches by machine to the top of the intact archaeological deposits, which would then be cleaned by hand, recorded and a sample excavated, sufficient to establish their date and character. The length of these trenches would be designed to cover 2-3% of the proposed development area. The trenches would be located to give a good general coverage of the site with some targeted on specific geophysical anomalies, such as a potential kiln site and the site of the original farm buildings at Roc House Farm and a sample of the possible medieval cultivation earthworks.

9.1.5 Following from the trenched evaluation and depending on the results of the earlier phases of mitigation, the next phase may comprise further archaeological excavation on areas of archaeological interest revealed through the evaluation, and/or an archaeological watching brief to be undertaken during the groundworks phase of the development.

9.2 Impacts on Non-designated Assets

9.2.1 Overall, the potential impact of the development on these sites is considered to be moderate and the mitigation outlined in sections 9.1.3-9.1.5 above is likely to be considered sufficient to mitigate against any potential impact.

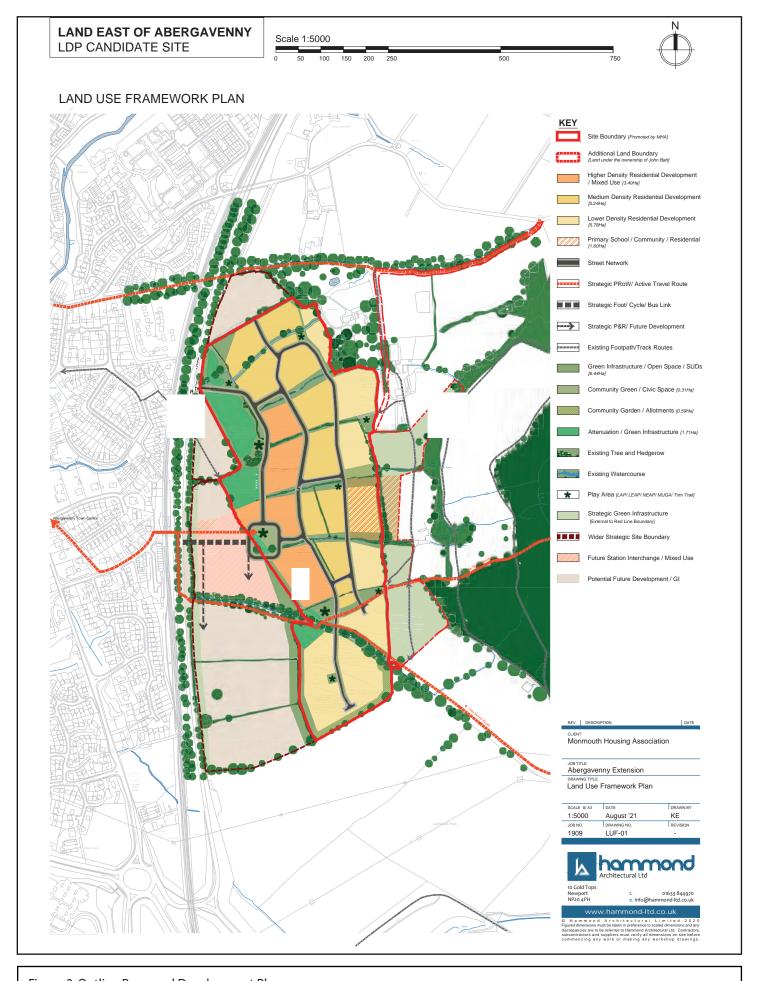
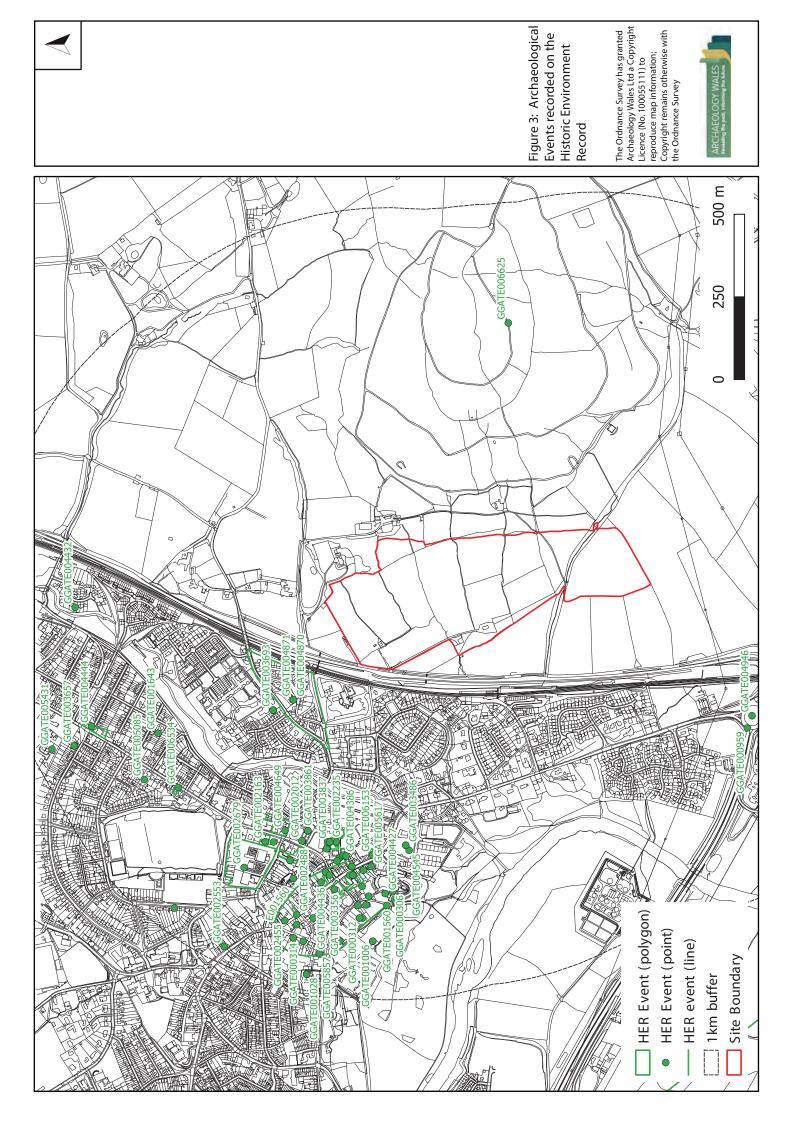
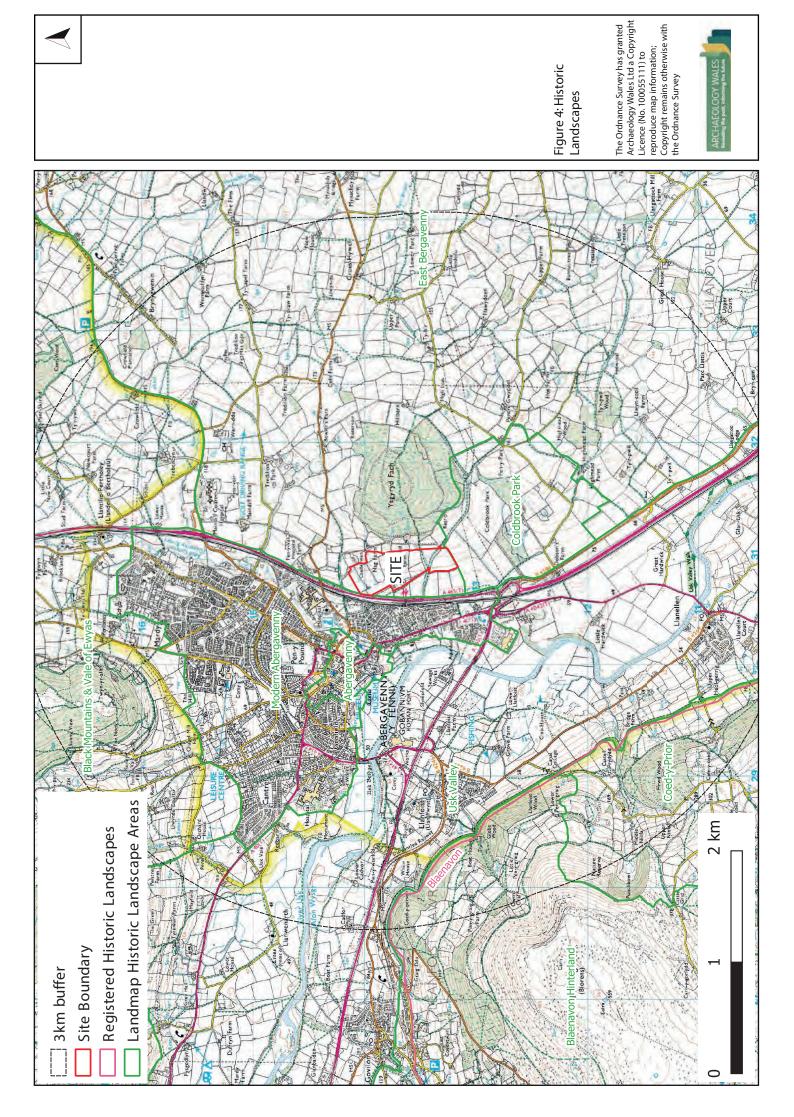
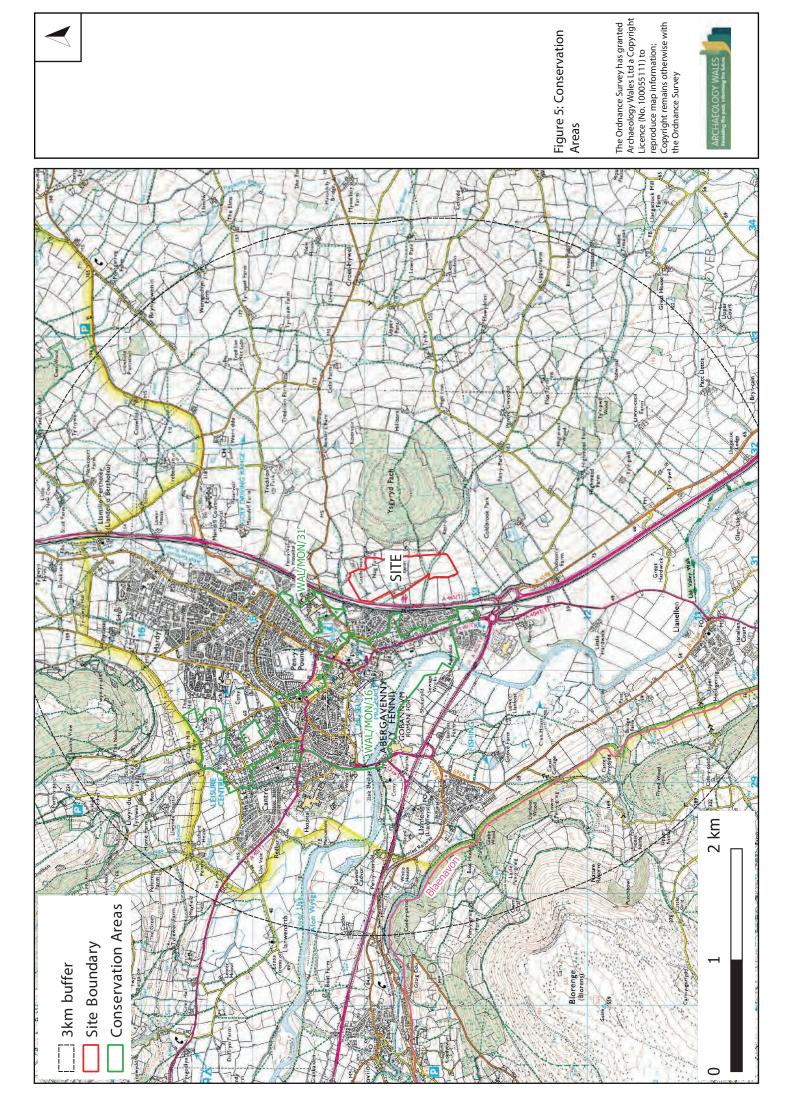


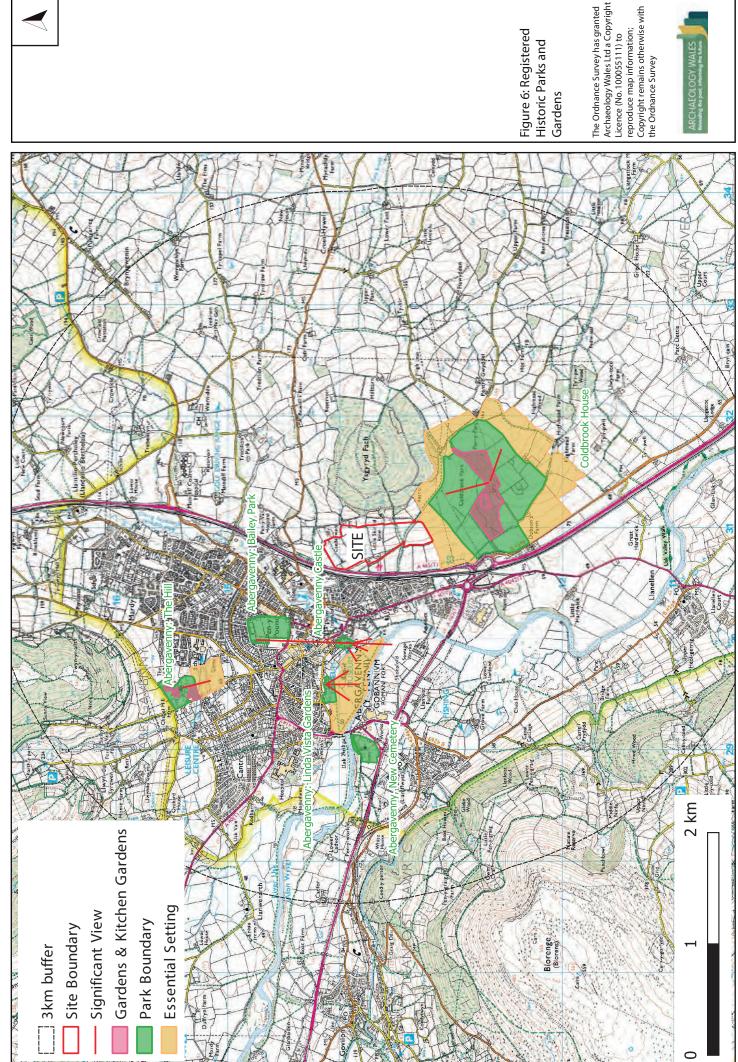
Figure 2: Outline Proposed Development Plan



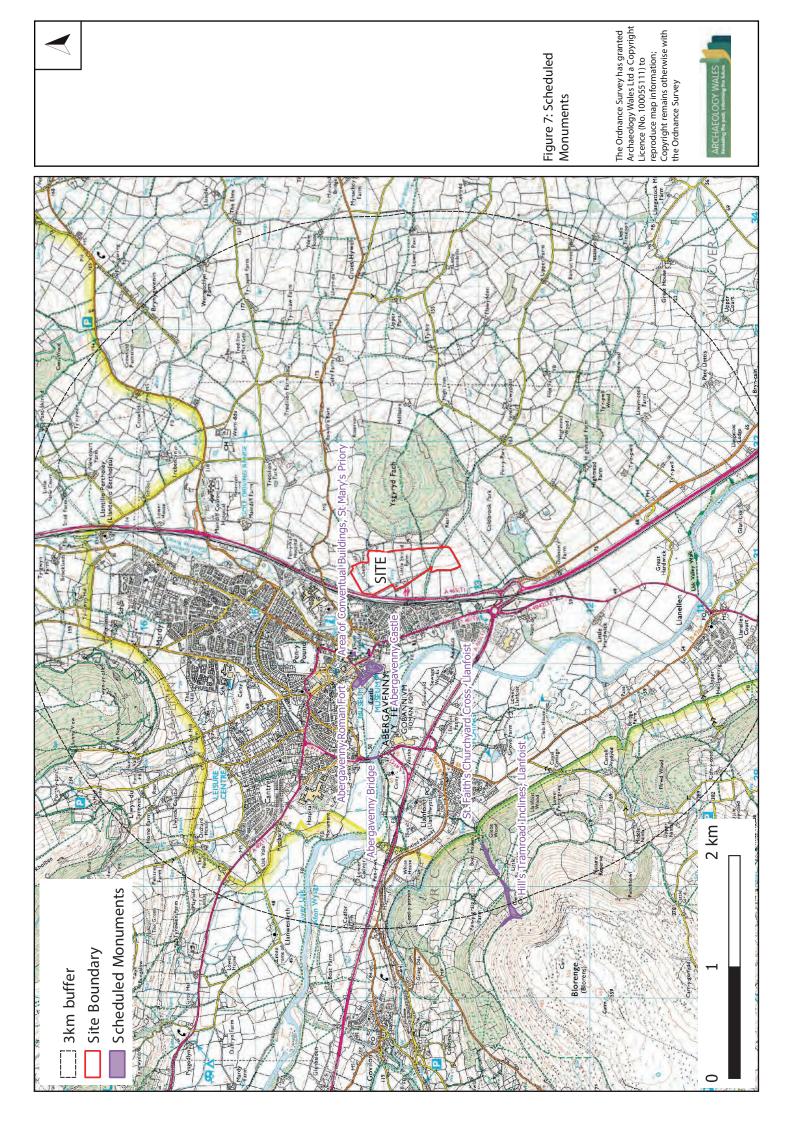


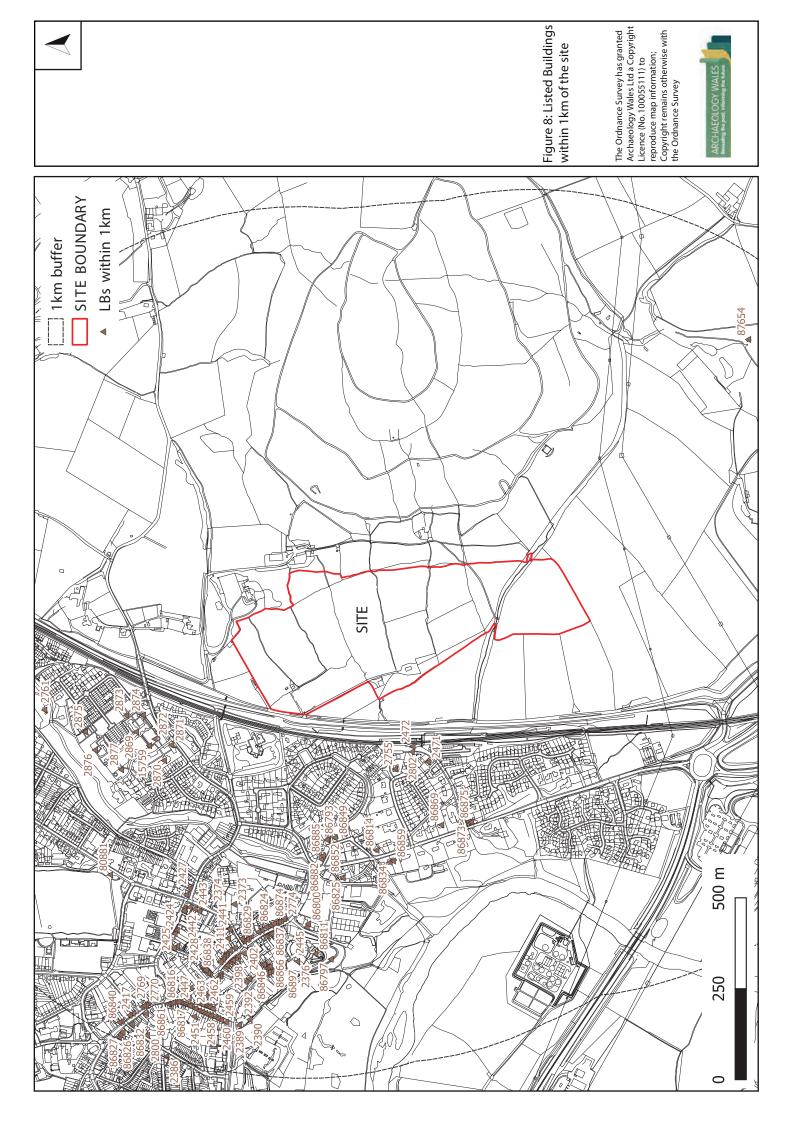


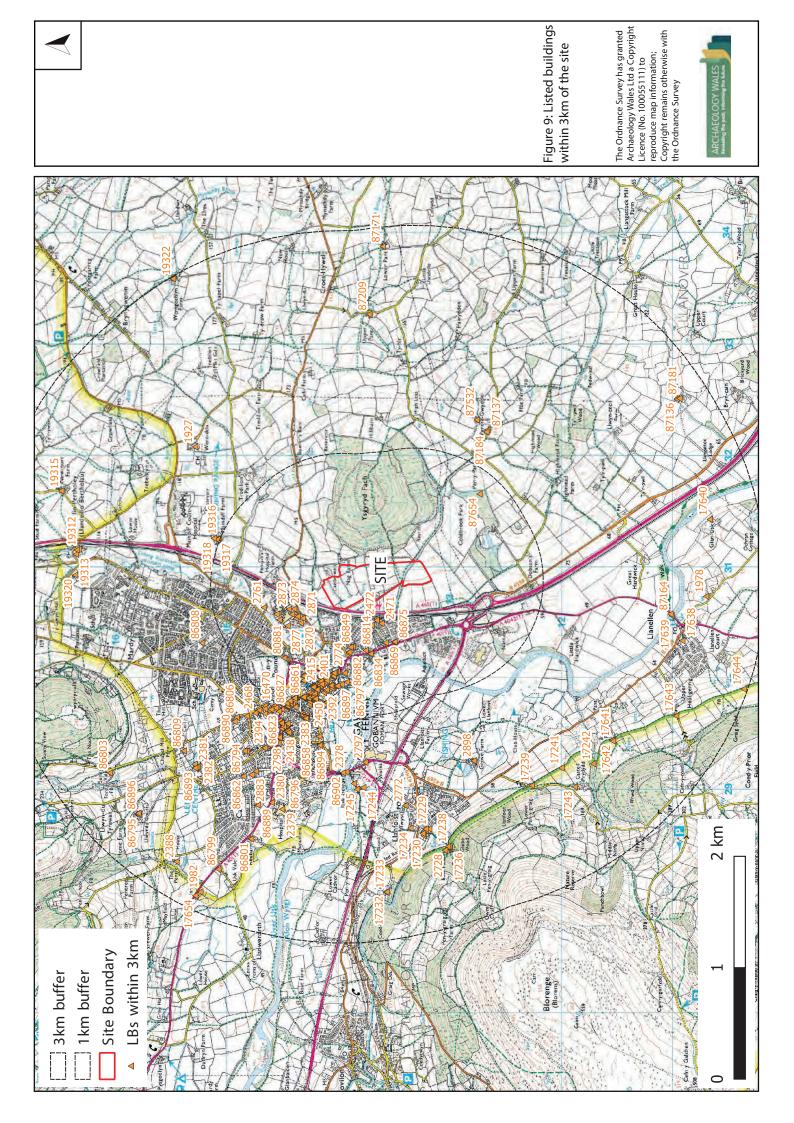












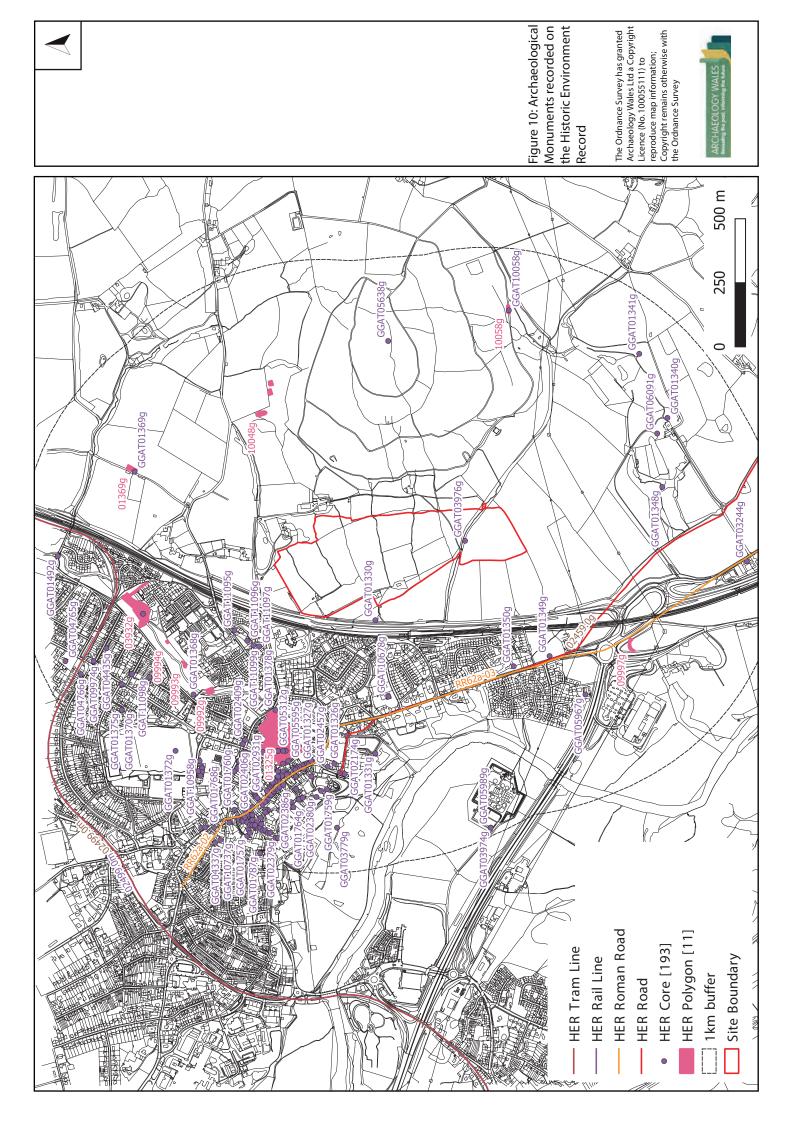




Figure 11: Extract from Ordnance Survey First Series, Sheet 42, 1832, originally printed at 1: 63360

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Figure 12: Extract from the Abergavenny Tithe Map, 1843

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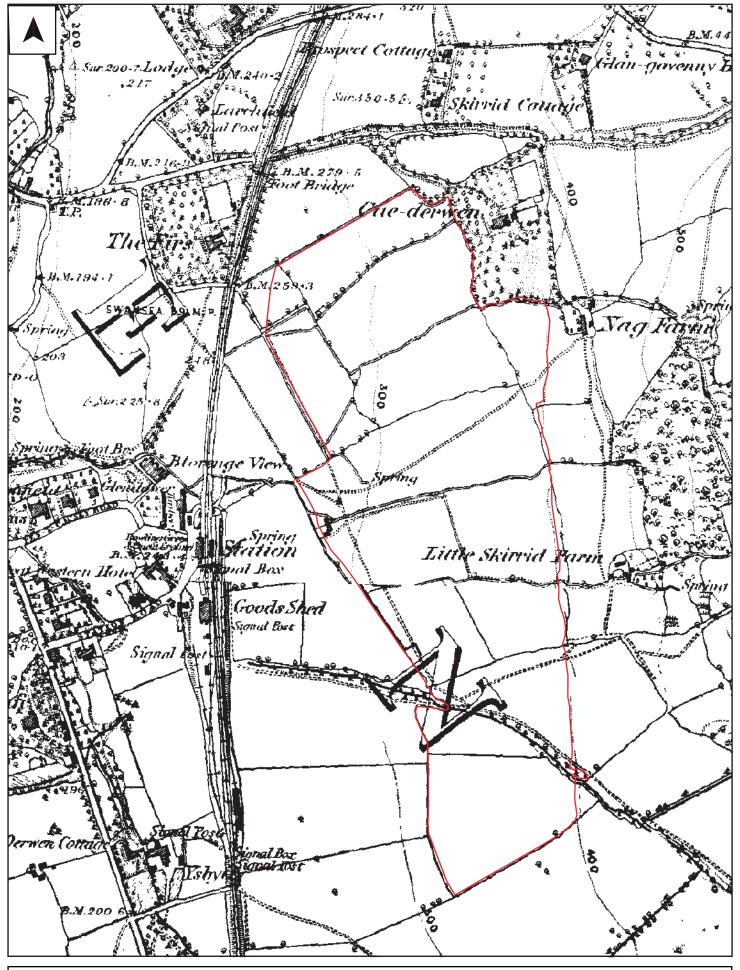


Figure 13: Extract from the Ordnance Survey County Series, Monmouthshire, 1886 edition, originally printed at 1:10,560

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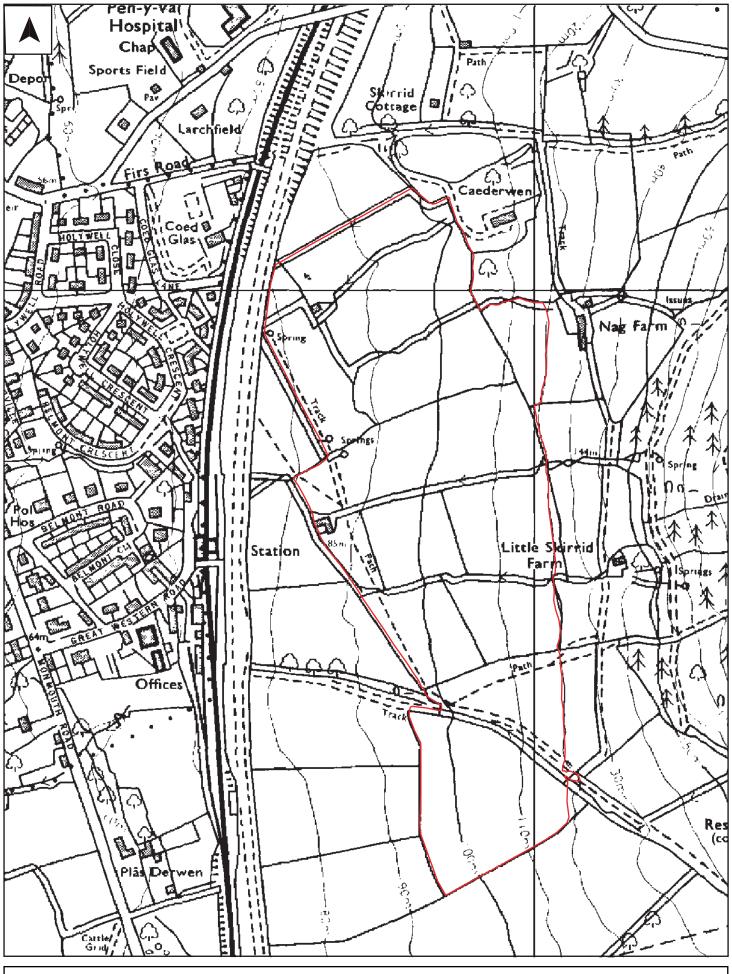


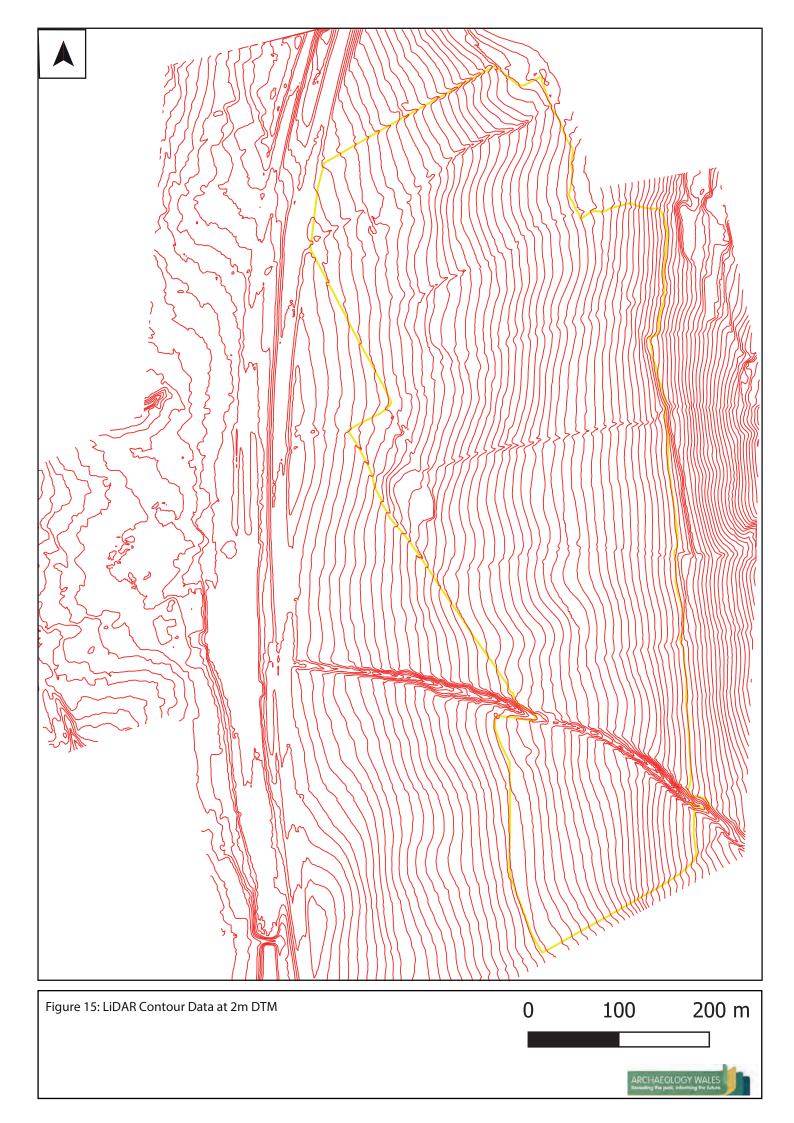
Figure 14: Extract from the Ordnance Survey Plan, 1977 Edition, originally printed at 1:10,000

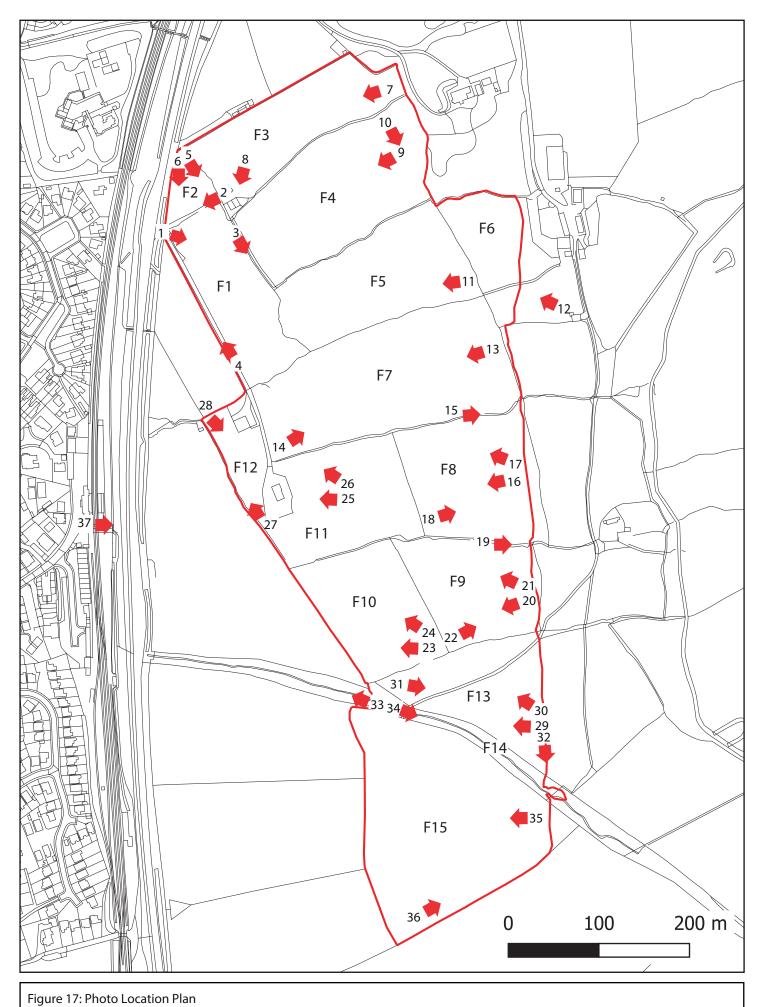
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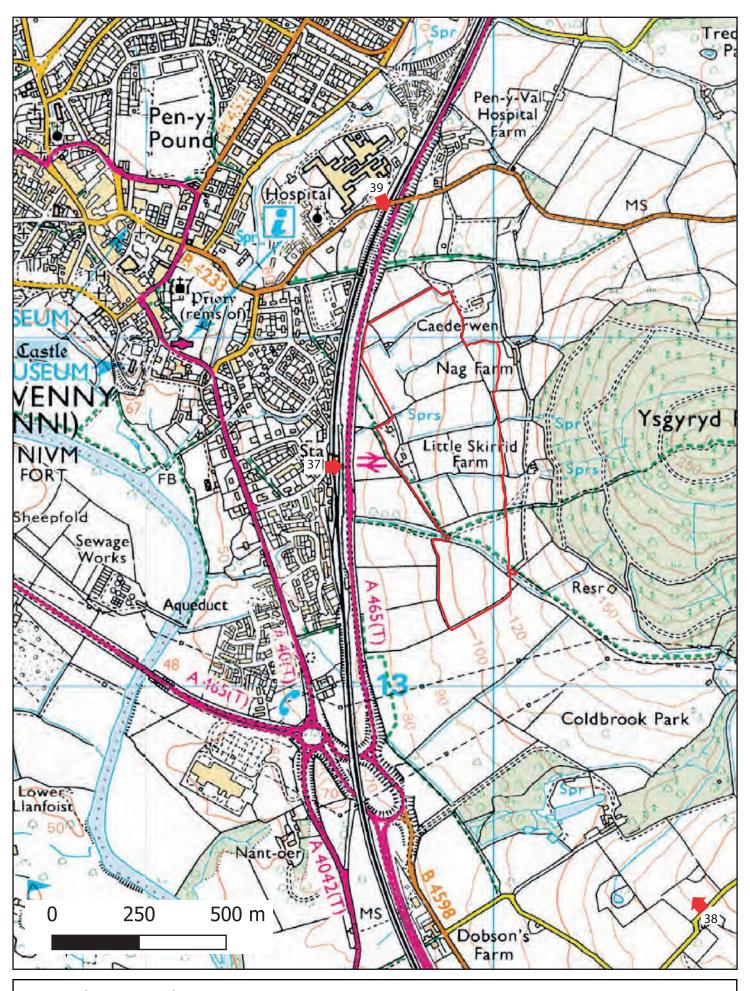


Figure 18: Photo Location Plan

This was supplemented by a study of primary documentary sources retained in the SMR and Abergavenny Museum together with reference to secondary sources. This consisted of an extant wall 0.61m wide of roughly coursed limestone blocks in two sections on either side of a doorway 1.17m wide. The foundations of the north wall of the structure were found c. 3.6m to the east, the south wall laying beyond the confines of the trench. A few sandstone slabs were all that survived of the floor. The materials and mortar used suggest the structure dated to the 18th century. The cellar feature had cut part of an earlier foundation trench. Finds from this feature were of Roman date.

At the south end are traces of a doorway, which is thought to have given access to a slype between the west and south ranges. In spite of the traditional name, it is more likely that this wall was originally part of the dorter block. (Evans 2010) A fabric analysis and interpretaion of the East Claustral Range conducted in 2000 recorded the existence of a slype that gave access to the cloister and confirmed the existence of a building, likely a monk's reredorter (Jones 2000). The priory is situated on the south-eastern side of the town. When St John's church was converted in to a free school, St Mary's (the priory chapel) succeeded that structure as parish church. It was originally built cruciform, but the alterations it has undergone have been so great, that the regularity of form, both in the interior and exterior, have been entirely destroyed. A final refurbishment of the defences took place after AD 250, but the construction of a building across the ramparts at some stage in the later 3rd century seems to herald the demise of the fort (Orchard Site; Building R3). Late Roman (presumably civilian) occupation continued in some

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form until at least the close of the 4th century, but its character and extent is not known in any detail. The Roman fort at Abergavenny now lies at least partially, and quite probably entirely, underneath the modern town. The fort was situated on high ground, close to the edge of a sharp slope that falls away southwards to the floodplain of the River Usk. The nave and N aisle are parallel and of nearly equal height and width, divided by an arcade supported on compound piers; both have arches at the E end, the one at the end of the nave giving access to the crossing under the central tower, which also has arches to both transepts and the chancel. The N transept opens to the N aisle, with the N walls of the aisle and transept on the same line. The chancel is separated from the chapels by arcades supported on heavy square piers similar to those at the crossing. The porch is of three bays, separated by doors; the main entrance is in the central bay, under a gable, and the side bays give access respectively to the nave and N aisle. The building seems to have been constructed mainly between the end of the 13th century and the end of the 14th century, although it is possible that some of work may have been carried out as a result of the damage inflicted on the priory by Owain Glyndwr (Robinson 1993, 45). Interpretation is hampered by extensive campaigns of rebuilding in 1882 and 1896, by the heavy pointing and remains of rendering still to be seen on parts of the medieval fabric, together with the painting of the piers of the arches in the crossing and the area to the E; and by the renewal of all the windows with the exception of four blocked windows in the chancel and Lewis chapel, of which only one retains its tracery, and the head of the E window. This last has been described as Norman (Gilbert nd, 16), but it is very wide and extremely slender. It may more plausibly be interpreted as Perpendicular, although the present Perpendicular tracery was put in 1922 when the window was restored to its former size, after having been reduced in 1828 to allow the chancel ceiling to be lowered (loc cit, and Sproule-Jones 1968, 11). The blocked window on the N wall of the Lewis Chapel suggests a date of the late 13th/early 14th century for this part of the building, which is consistent with the larger (renewed) window on this wall, and the arcades: the E window in this chapel is an insertion. The tower appears to be 14th century, as it has ogee-headed

windows, it may therefore be slightly later be slightly later than the chapels; the masonry too is clearly distinguishable. The partial blocking of the first-floor lights in the tower by the chancel and N transept roofs indicates that these must originally have been lower, or at least of lower pitch. It is possible that the chancel clerestory is in fact an addition, as might be suggested by the difference in masonry of the N wall. What little can be seen of the clerestory windows (probably two each side) suggests that they date rather later than the original construction of the E end and were part of the presumed Perpendicular refenestration of the church. Restorations of the 19th and 20th century are reasonably well documented. The main effect of the restoration of 1828 was to remove the central arcade between the nave and N aisle to provide single space surrounded by galleries and covered by a new roof of single span, and also to lower the chancel roof (with concomitant reduction in size of the E window) and effectively cut the chancel off from the nave. In 1874 Gilbert Scott was commissioned to report on the state of the fabric and propose measures to restore the church to its medieval form. Some, though not all, of his proposals were adopted over the course of a series of restorations in 1882, 1896, 1911 and 1922 (Gilbert nd, 16); it is possible that at least some work was carried out shortly after the report was made, although this is not recorded by Gilbert; a lapse of eight years between proposals for works and their being carried out was not normal in the Victorian period, and Scott noted at that that the window in the Herbert chapel had badly decayed mullions and tracery which urgently needed renewal. If this is the case, the renewal of the windows in the S wall of the nave and the insertion or enlargement of the windows in the N and S walls of the nave (not mentioned in Glynne's description of 1836: Glynne 1902, 81-3), all of which are in the same limestone, may have taken place at the same time. The 1882 restoration saw the rebuilding of the nave and N aisle, with a new arcade between them, and the construction of a new W porch/narthex. The S wall of the nave does not appear to have been greatly affected by these changes; it still retains much of its early masonry, and the windows, which retain elements of their ?original dressings were probably at a different date. The masonry used in this campaign of restoration was a distinctive Victorian style featuring squared rock-faced blocks set in snecked courses with dressings of a medium-grained sandstone streaked with red and yellowish-fawn. The 1896 restorations concentrated on the chancel and chapels, and it is possible that the renewal of windows using limestone, if not done in the 1870s, dates to this period, since it involved major work in the chancel. The construction of a new vaulted ceiling in the chancel should also be linked to the raising of the roof. The lower part of the tower, within the church, took place in 1911, although the upper part had to wait until 1950. The E window in the chancel was restored and provided with new tracery in 1922, and the N transept window built in 1954, replacing an earlier window noted by Col Symonds in 1645 (GRO D992.4); the dressings of both windows used the same stone as that employed in the 1882 restorations (Sproule-Jones 1968, 11). Further restorations and renovations took place in the 1960s, but are not so clearly visible in the fabric, and a campaign of restoration of the monuments in the Herbert Chapel was taking place at the time of this survey; archaeological investigation forms a part of this work (Locock 1994a and 1994b; Page 1994). The most notable fittings in the church are the Norman font bowl, the 15th century choir stalls (Crossley and Ridgway 1959, 20-8) and the extensive collection of monuments. DESCRIPTION Main Building An Act of Parliament, the Lunacy Act, of 1845 resulted in the counties of Monmouth, Hereford, Brecon and Radnor building a Joint Lunatic Asylum here at Abergavenny 1847-52. The Asylum was opened 1st December 1851 at a cost of £37083; architect Thomas Fulljames of Fulljames and Waller of Gloucester. It initially had twelve wards and 210 inmates. This work forms the basis for much of the long front range; the right hand Infirmary wing was added in 1859-61. The Laundry block was added in 1861-75. These completed the Fulljames design which was much more Gothic in style than the building is today. A plan that was in one of the main offices at the time of listing (1992) dated 1895 by John Giles, Gough and Trollope, architects of London indicates that they carried out the considerable extensions of the 1880s, and this included the re-modelling of the main central elevation. The majority of the stone rear ranges date from 1881-83 including the Central Administration Block and the Epileptic Block (but see below). The Working Men's Dormitory was added in 1891 by Alfred Swash, and further work was done in 1901-4 and 1910, this involved the rebuilding of the four main gables and was done by the local architect Edward Johnson; subsequent ranges and alterations in conversion to modern hospital use. During the latter half of C19 the catchment area for this asylum was greatly reduced, although it could now house 1170 patients. It became the Monmouthshire Asylum in 1897, the Monmouth Mental Hospital in 1930 and finally Pen-y-Val Hospital in 1948. With changing attitudes to mental care the use of the hospital declined and it was closed in 1997. A scheme for conversion to apartments was drawn up by Graham Frecknall of Monmouth and this has now been fully realised. It has involved the demolition of certain sections of the hospital buildings described above, but the main long range with the return wings at either end has been carefully restored, as have the Lodge and all the Shelters in the gardens (qqv), the Church remains in need of repair and reuse. The projecting and clasping blocks at the south-east (Infirmary) and north-west ends of the main range survive only in part, while everything behind the main range apart from the two principal wings has gone and this includes the Central Administration Block and most of the additions of 1881-3 and of 1891 mentioned above. These have been replaced by new build, with two rows of houses in the rear centre as well as many new houses on the northern part of the site and two matching Lodges at the site entrance by the railway bridge, these last being in a deliberate repro-style. Built of coursed squared rock-faced local red sandstone rubble masonry, snecked to later work with plinth, stringcourse and Bath freestone dressings; natural slate roofs and stone chimney stacks. The earlier ranges by Thomas Fulljames are in the Gothic style of William Butterfield; later alterations have elements of various styles, both classical and Jacobethan. Mainly three storeys, with the main front almost virtually symmetrical and punctuated by projecting gabled bays, three on either side of the main entrance. The entrance elevation is five windows wide with 2 and 3-light stone mullioned windows in flat heads. Central classical porch with paired Doric columns and parapet extending across flanking bays. Full height Jacobethan derived frontispiece above with octagonal tourelles; square clock turret with swept roof with stacks at either gable. This detailing is all by Giles and Gough and dates from c1883 when the Chapel was removed from the upper floors and replaced by the Board and Committee Rooms. Gabled bays project to left and right with large octagonal stacks in the angles. The gabled bays have 4-light windows; acutely pointed to the second floor and grouped under one arch with Beaufort coat of arms, to south-east gable; cusped arches below and Caernarvon arches to ground floor. Running outwards and set back between the next projecting gables are 5-bay sections that have gables, broader to middle, and lateral chimney breasts with paired diagonally set stacks; cusped 2-light windows to first floor. The next projecting bay to the southeast is dated 1910 over the second floor windows; similar window arrangement to the previous gabled bay. The equivalent bay to north-west is 4-storey and dated 1851; the building steps down beyond. Both of these gables have 2-windows to the lower floors and above are large octagonal freestone ventilation towers rising from square bases; animal carved gargoyles and other figures. Three more bays lead to the corners; the central ones of which are gabled and advanced to a shallower depth; splayed bays to ground and first floors with parapets. Beaufort arms again to the south-east gable. Advanced corner towers with French Renaissance style roofs and ironworks cresting (see References); shouldered doorways. All the roofs are high and steeply pitched to match the gables. The greater part of the cross wing to the south-east was the 1859-61 Infirmary, but only the rear wing of this now survives giving an additional gable to the main elevation which is also mirrored at the north-west end. Five bay returns with three gabled dormers. The rear elevation of the main range has two projecting wings of Victorian date and, inside them and flanking the main axis, two rows of newly completed houses which are on the site of the former Central Administration block. The Victorian elevations have 2, 3 and 4-light windows of the different types described above and there are additional two storey bays, gables, gabled dormers and chimney stacks as before, giving a varied articulation but with the scars of new stonework where additions and features have been removed are also still much in evidence. The rubble walls of the original courtyards survive to some extent at the rear, particularly the wall bordering the inner side of the perimeter drive, splayed outwards beside the octagonal shelter and stepped down towards the front where two cross walls form a small yard entered through pointed arch doorways. Much of the original corridor system was retained up to closure in 1997, but the subsequent conversion to apartments has of necessity destroyed most of this. Rectnagular shelter in grounds Contemporary with the early C20 expansion of the hospital (qv Pen-y-fal Apartments) which was first built in the mid C19 as the Joint County Lunatic Asylum. Considerable new building was done here in 1901-4 and 1910 designed by Edward Johnson. Public Health Acts and reforms had created the requirement to provide institutionalised people with the opportunity for outdoor recreation. These shelters are probably prefabricated designs bought from a catalogue. They were commonly provided in Asylums at this time and were also used in all kinds of public parks and promenades. Spa or seaside style rectangular timber shelter with gabled roof, covered with new broadly corrugated steel sheeting and with ironwork cresting. Each side has three cambered openings, broader and full height to centre; otherwise boarded below and mullioned openings above on the long sides. Pillars dividing the bays have guttae and fluting. Planked benches to seating areas on all four sides (CADW listed building register).

Summary

This Written Scheme of Investigation (WSI) details the proposal for an archaeological Desk Based Assessment and Site Visit on Land East of the A465, Abergavenny as a Candidate Site for residential development within the forthcoming Monmouthshire County Council Local Development Plan review. The site is centred on NGR SO 30932 13929. It has been prepared by Archaeology Wales Ltd for Monmouthshire Housing Association, in support of a forthcoming submission to the LPA. The local planning authority is Monmouthshire County Council.

The purpose of the proposed Desk Based Assessment and Site Visit is to highlight and assess the impact of the proposed development on the archaeological resource.

All work will be undertaken in accordance with the standards and guidelines of the Chartered Institute for Archaeologists (2020).

1. Introduction and planning background

This WSI details the proposal for an archaeological Desk Based Assessment (DBA) and Site Visit to be undertaken in the promotion of Land East of the A465, Abergavenny, as a Candidate Site for residential development within the forthcoming Monmouthshire County Council Local Development Plan. The site is centred on NGR SO 30932 13929 (Figure 1 and 2). The local planning authority is Monmouthshire County Council (MCC).

The site is located east of, and adjacent to, the current urban area of Abergavenny. The parcel of land measures approximately 24.8 hectares, situated east of the A465. The site currently comprises open countryside / greenfield land used for agricultural purposes.

This WSI has been prepared by Dr John Davey, Archaeology Wales Ltd (henceforth - AW) at the request of Monmouthshire Housing Association.

The methodology set out in this WSI has been agreed with Glamorgan-Gwent Archaeological Trust – Archaeological Planning Management (GGAT-APM) in its capacity as archaeological advisors to the local planning authority (MCC). The purpose of the proposed Desk Based Assessment and Site Visit is to provide the local planning authority with the information they are likely to request in respect of the proposed development, the requirements for which are set out in Planning Policy Wales Revised Edition.11, Section 6.1 (2021) and Technical Advice Note (TAN) 24: The Historic Environment (2017). The work is to highlight and assess the impact of the proposed development on the archaeological resource.

All work will conform to the Standard and Guidance for Archaeological Desk Based Assessment (ClfA 2020) and be undertaken by suitably qualified staff to the highest professional standards. AW is a Registered Organisation with the ClfA.

2. Development Details & Site Description

The proposed development is a candidate site for the forthcoming Monmouthshire County Council Local Development Plan. It is understood that the proposed development would comprise the construction of new housing stock, roads, retail and hospitality space associated infrastructure, amenity space and associated landscaping on land east of the A465, Abergavenny, centred on SO 30932 13929 (Figure 1 and 2).

The proposed development area currently comprises open countryside / greenfield land used for agricultural purposes. The western border of the site is defined by the Abergavenny Settlement boundary.

The site is approximately rectangular in plan (Figure 2) and comprises 24.8 hectares of agricultural fields. It lies on a west facing slope at the foot of Ysgyryd Fach between the 120m and 80m contours. It is partly bounded on the northwest by the A465, to the northeast by land associated with the properties of Caederwen and Garth Farm, to the east by land associated with Little Skirrid, and to the south and west by agricultural fields.

The site lies approximately 150m east of Abergavenny rail station and 1km ESE of the historic core of Abergavenny.

The underlying geology for the site comprises argillaceous rocks and interbedded Sandstone, of the St Maughans Formation, sedimentary bedrock formed approximately 393 to 419 million years ago in the Devonian Period. The bedrock is overlain by Devensian Till, Diamicton: superficial deposits formed up to 2 million years ago in the Quaternary Period. There are no borehole data available for the site on the Geology of Britain Viewer website, although there is data available from a series of boreholes dug for Monmouthshire County Council along the line of the Abergavenny Eastern By Pass (A465) immediately to the west of the site (BGS, Geology of Britain Viewer – accessed 26/07/2021). The soils are classed as freely draining slightly acid loamy soils (http://www.landis.org.uk/soilscapes/ - accessed 26/07/21).

3. Historical background

There are no designated archaeological sites within the proposed development area. The nearest Scheduled Monument, *Abergavenny Castle Castle* (PRN Gt9) lies 600m to the west. The nearest listed building, *Abergavenny Railway Station, including down platform building and footbridge* (LB 2472) lies 150m to the west. The nearest Conservation Areas, lie in Abergavenny approximately 150m to the NNW (WAL/MON/31) and 150m to the west (WAL/MON/16). The nearest Registered Historic Park and Garden, *Coldbrook House* (Gt30) lies 150m to the Southeast, although land designated as part of its essential setting directly borders the southern site boundary.

The site lies within the landmap historic landscape area of *East Bergavenny* (MNMTHHL049).

4. Objectives

The primary objective will be to assess the impact of the development proposals on the historic environment by means of a Desk Based Assessment and Site Visit. This will help

inform future decision making, design solutions and potential mitigation strategies. The aim will be to make full and effective use of existing information in establishing the archaeological significance of the site, to elucidate the presence or absence of archaeological material, its character, distribution, extent, condition and relative significance.

The work will include a comprehensive assessment of regional context within which the archaeological evidence rests and will aim to highlight any relevant research issues within national and regional research frameworks.

The work will result in a report that will provide information of sufficient detail to allow informed planning decisions to be made which can safeguard the archaeological resource. Preservation *in situ* will be advocated where at all possible, but where engineering or other factors result in loss of archaeological deposits, preservation by record will be recommended.

5. The proposed archaeological work

The aim of the work will be to establish and make available information about the archaeological resource existing on the site. The work will include the following elements:

- Desk Based Assessment (Stage 1)
- A site visit (Stage 2)
- The production of an illustrated report (Stage 3)

6. Method Statement for a Detailed Desk Based Assessment (Stage 1)

The assessment will consider the following:

- a) The nature, extent and degree of survival of archaeological sites, structures, deposits and landscapes within the study area through assessment of various readily available primary sources:
- 1. Collation and assessment of all relevant information held in the regional HER at Swansea, including listed building records, within a 1km radius of the assessment area boundary.
- 2. Collation and consideration of the impact on Designated archaeological sites (Scheduled Ancient Monuments, Historic Parks & Gardens, registered historic landscapes, Conservation Areas) within a 3km radius of the assessment area boundary.
- 3. Assessment of all available excavation report and archives including unpublished and unprocessed material affecting the site and its setting.
- 4. Assessment of all relevant extant aerial photographic (AP) evidence. This will include those held by the regional HER and the Royal Commission on the Ancient and Historical Monuments of Wales (RCAHMW), in Aberystwyth.
- 5. All sources indexed in the County Archive, and as appropriate, site files held by the RCAHMW.
- 6. Records held by the developer e.g. bore hole logs, geological/geomorphological information, aerial photographs, maps, plans

- 7. Map regression analysis using all relevant cartographic sources e.g. All editions of the Ordnance Survey County Series, Tithe and early estate maps (as available).
- 8. Place name evidence
- 9. Internet sourced satellite imagery and Lidar imagery as available.
- 10. Assessment of records held at the Portable Antiquities Scheme.
- 11. Historic documents (e.g. Charters, registers, estate papers).
- b) The significance of any remains in their context both regionally and nationally and in light of the findings of the desk-based study.
- c) The history of the site based on the areas of research outlined above.
- d) The potential impact of any proposed development on the setting of known sites of archaeological importance (this will constitute a brief assessment, rather than a formal assessment such as that detailed in the Cadw guidelines of 2017).
- e) The potential for further archaeological remains to be present, which have not been identified in pre-existing archaeological records.
- f) The potential for further work, with recommendations if requested and where appropriate for a suitable investigative and/or mitigation methodology.

7. The Site Visit (Stage 2)

The site visit will be a visual walked search of the entire development area. The ground surface will be visually inspected for all earthworks, structures and finds. The location of any environmental archaeological deposits, or areas which may have a potential for such deposits, will also be taken into account along with the more traditional 'visible' archaeology.

All located sites or finds will be accurately fixed by means of GPS. Each individual find or site location will have an accurate NGR reference attached. Where a close cluster of related features is identified a single NGR for the centre of the cluster will be used, and each constituent feature separately described in the text.

The character, function, condition, vulnerability, potential dating and relationship to other features of each identified site or find will be described fully. The importance of the site or find will be assessed in terms of local, regional or national significance.

A sketch survey of each identified site layout will be made with accompanying metric measurements

Written, drawn and photographic records of an appropriate level of detail will be maintained throughout the course of the project. Digital photographs, including metric scales, will be taken using cameras with resolutions of 10 mega pixels or above. Photographs will be taken in RAW format.

Illustrations will be drawn to a scale of 1:50, 1:20 and 1:10 as required, and these will be related to Ordnance Survey datum and published boundaries where appropriate.

8. The production of an illustrated report and the deposition of the site archive (Stage 3)

A report will be produced which synthesises the results of stages 1 and 2 and thereby assesses the total archaeological resource within the development area.

The results will be presented in such a way that data and supporting text are readily cross-referenced. The regional HER Officer will be contacted to ensure that any sites or monuments not previously recorded in the HER are given a Primary Record Number (PRN) and that data structure is compatible with the *Guidance for the Submission of Data to the Welsh Historic Environment Records (2018).* The historical development of the site will be presented in phased maps and plans comprising clearly, the outline of the site.

Within the report an attempt will be made to indicate areas of greater or lesser archaeological significance and the sites will be ranked in level of overall archaeological importance (locally, regionally and nationally).

All relevant aerial photographs and historic maps will be included and be fully referenced. Any site photographs included in the report will be appropriately captioned and clearly located on a suitably scaled site plan.

The report will be used to inform future decision making regarding further stages of archaeological work (Field Evaluation, Watching Brief etc), the development construction and processes used.

The report will specifically include the following:

- 1. a copy of the design brief
- 2. a location plan
- 3. all identified sites plotted on an appropriately scaled plan of the proposal site
- 4. a gazetteer of all located sites and finds with full dimensional and descriptive detail including grid reference and period

Copies of the report will be sent to: The client, GGAT-APM, and for inclusion in the regional HER. Digital copies will be provided in pdf format if required.

Any further stages of archaeological work, after the submission of the report for stages one and two outlined above, will be the subject of an additional GGAT-APM curatorial brief against which a further AW specification will be drawn up.

The site archive

The final archive (site and research) will, whenever appropriate, be deposited with a suitable receiving institution, usually the relevant Local Authority museums service. Arrangements will be made with the receiving institution before work starts.

Although there may be a period during which client confidentiality will need to be maintained, copies of all reports and the final archive will be deposited no later than six months after completion of the work.

Copies of all reports, the digital archive and an archive index will be deposited with the National Monuments Record, RCAHMW, Aberystwyth.

Wherever the archive is deposited, this information will be relayed to the HER. A summary of the contents of the archive will be supplied to GGAT-APM.

The archive will be deposited in accordance with the National Standard and Guidance to Best Practice for Collecting and Depositing Archaeological Archives in Wales (National Panel for Archaeological Archives in Wales, 2019).

9. Staff

The project will be managed by Dr John Davey MCIfA MIScT (RSci) (AW Project Manager) and the assessment undertaken by suitably trained and experienced AW staff. Any alteration to staffing before or during the work will be brought to the attention of GGAT-APM and the client.

Additional Considerations

10. Health and Safety

10.1 Risk assessment

Prior to the commencement of the site visit AW will carry out and produce a formal Health and Safety Risk Assessment in accordance with the Management of Health and safety Regulations 1992.
