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Abstract

Avon Archaeology Limited was commissioned by The Trustees of Morspan Pension Scheme Ltd to undertake an archaeological desk-based assessment of land adjacent to Llanellen Court, Llanellen, Monmouthshire, as a Candidate Site for residential development. The study area is centred on NGR SO 30303 10656, is of irregular shape, and encompasses an area of about 3.39 hectares. It lies to the south of the village of Llanellen, itself to the south of Abergavenny.

There are no Scheduled Ancient Monuments or listed buildings within the bounds of the study area or in the immediate vicinity. An assessment of the cartographic evidence indicated that the study area was, and always had been undeveloped land within the period of mapping that was available. No archaeological intervention has been carried out in the study area, so the presence or absence of buried archaeological remains cannot be ascertained from a review of the documentary evidence alone. The proposed development would result in damage to any currently unknown archaeological remains of post-medieval or earlier date that may be present within the site, which may well require further investigation or mitigation.

Crynodeb

Comisiynwyd Avon Archaeology Limited gan Ymddiriedolwyr Morspan Pension Scheme Ltd i wneud asesiad archaeolegol wrth ddesg o dir yn gyfagos at fferm Llanellen Court, Llanelen, Sir Fynwy, fel Safle Ymgeisiol ar gyfer datblygiad preswyl. Mae canolbwynt ardal yr astudiaeth yng Nghyfeirnod Grid Cenedlaethol SO 30303 10656, mae'n afreolaidd ei siâp ac yn cwmpasu ardal o ryw 3.39 hectar. Mae i'r de o bentref Llanelen, sydd ei hun i'r de o'r Fenni.

Nid oes unrhyw Henebion Cofrestredig neu adeiladau rhestredig o fewn ffiniau ardal yr astudiaeth nac yn y cyffiniau agos. Roedd asesiad o'r dystiolaeth gartograffig yn awgrymu mai tir heb ei ddatblygu oedd ardal yr astudiaeth, ac mai dyma y bu erioed o fewn cyfnod y mapiau a oedd ar gael. Ni chafwyd unrhyw ymyrraeth archaeolegol o fewn ffin y llinell goch, felly ni ellir cadarnhau presenoldeb neu absenoldeb gweddillion archaeolegol claddedig o adolygu'r dystiolaeth ddogfennol yn unig, ond mae'n eithaf posibl bod adnoddau archaeolegol sydd heb eu darganfod yn bresennol ar y safle. Byddai'r datblygiad arfaethedig yn arwain at ddifrod i unrhyw weddillion archaeolegol o'r cyfnod ôl-ganoloesol neu ddyddiad cynharach a allai fod yn bresennol o fewn y safle ond sy'n anhysbys ar hyn o bryd, a gallai hyn yn bendant alw am archwiliad neu gamau lliniaru pellach.

1. Introduction

- 1.1 Avon Archaeology Limited has been commissioned by Trustees of Morspan Pension Scheme Ltd, to undertake a Archaeological Desk Based Assessment of their proposed site at Llanellen in Monmouthshire, to assess the potential for the preservation of significant archaeological deposits on the site.
- 1.2 The proposed site is land adjacent to Llanellen Court, *aka* Llanellen Court Farm, Llanellen, near Abergavenny, which is a Monmouthshire Candidate Site (CS0027) "to be considered for development, redevelopment or protection in the Monmouthshire Replacement Local Development Plan" (Monmouthshire County Council, 2023); it comprises an area measuring approximately 3.39 hectares, centred on NGR SO 30303 10656. The intention is to provide 25-30 dwellings.
- 1.3 The present document is framed so as to conform closely to the standard and guidance issued by the Chartered Institute for Archaeologists (CIfA) for this kind of project. Specifically, the overarching controlling text is found in the *Standard and guidance for historic environment desk-based assessment*, last substantively updated in January 2017. A copy of the completed report will be sent to the Glamorgan-Gwent Archaeological Trust for accession into its HER.

2 Local and National Planning Policies

- 2.1 In Wales, national policy relating to matters of heritage was laid down in overarching legislation in the form of the Historic Environment (Wales) Act, 2016. So far as it relates specifically to planning, guidance in this respect is outlined in the document *Planning Policy Wales*, the 11th and most recent edition of which was issued in February 2021. In that source, matters relating specifically to the historic environment are dealt with in Chapter 6, "Distinctive and Natural Places". Within that chapter, the place of archaeology within the context of the planning framework comes under Sections 6.1.1 to 6.1.9.
- 2.2 Planning Policy Wales Technical Advice Note 24: The Historic Environment defines an archaeological desk-based assessment as

A programme of study of the historic environment within a specified area or site on land, the inter-tidal zone or underwater that addresses agreed research and/or conservation objectives. It consists of an analysis of existing written,



graphic, photographic and electronic information in order to identify the likely heritage assets, their interests and significance and the character of the study area, including appropriate consideration of the settings of heritage assets and, the nature, extent and quality of the known or potential archaeological, historic, architectural and artistic interest. Significance is to be judged in a local, regional, national or international context as appropriate (TAN 24 2017, 46).

Cadw, in their 2011 document 'Conservation Principles', state

In order to assess the significance of an historic asset, four component [heritage] values need to be considered. These are:

- Evidential value
- Historical value
- Aesthetic value
- Communal value (CADW 2011a, 10)
- 2.3 The local authority, which in this case is Monmouthshire County Council, in determining any planning application in relation to matters of archaeological interest, has been subject to this national planning guidance, and to its own local planning policy which is informed by it. Local authorities are also offered guidance in the form of the Welsh Government's Technical Advice Notice No. 24 *The Historic Environment* (2017). Responsibility for Scheduled Ancient Monuments rests with CADW, *not* with local and/or unitary authorities.
- 2.4 The Monmouthshire County Council Adopted Local Development Plan 2011-2021 was adopted 27th February 2014 and will remain in place for all planning decisions until the Replacement LDP 2018-2033 is formally adopted. The LDP contains Strategic Policy S17 with the aim "To protect sites and buildings of acknowledged built and historic interest".
 - 3.15 The Monmouthshire LPA area has a rich built heritage and historic environment which includes:
 - 31 Conservation Areas designated for their special historic or architectural interest, covering some 1,648 hectares in total.
 - 44 Historic Parks and Gardens identified as having a Special Historic Interest, covering 1,910 hectares.



- 3 Landscapes of Outstanding Historic Interest identified by Cadw within the Monmouthshire area namely parts of Blaenavon, the Gwent Levels and the Lower Wye Valley.
- Approximately 169 Scheduled Ancient Monuments.
- Approximately 2,200 Listed Buildings, of which 2% are Grade I, 10% are Grade II* and 88% are Grade II. Of note, around 176 Listed Buildings have been identified as being at risk.

Monmouthshire has a significant built heritage resource in terms of scheduled ancient monuments, listed buildings, conservation areas, historic parks and gardens and archaeologically sensitive sites that, together with their settings, require protection and enhancement.

The LDP seeks to influence these issues by: Containing measures to preserve and enhance the cultural heritage and historic environment of Monmouthshire.

Section 6.5.8 states that

"Monmouthshire is renowned for its rich, high quality historic environment which is reflected in the wealth of conservation areas, listed buildings and scheduled ancient monuments within the County. The built environment heritage is widely recognised as one of the County's key tourism and amenity assets. These assets are irreplaceable and any detrimental impact upon them can have significant cultural, environmental, economic and social costs. It is essential therefore, that the County's historic environment is preserved and, where possible, enhanced". (MC, 2014, 167)

2.5 Monmouthshire County Council's Landscape Draft Supplementary Planning Guidance of August 2019 describes "landscape character" as the result of the interaction of natural and human factors, encompassing

natural landscape aspects (e.g. geology, hydrology), cultural aspects (e.g. archaeology, settlement) and sensory aspects(e.g.sense of tranquillity or wildness). (MCC 2019).



46 Landscape Character Areas have been identified and described. The Llanellen Local Landscape Character Area (LLCA) is referred to below (MMC 2020).

3. Methodology

- 3.1 The methodology for this assessment follows that set out in the Written Scheme of Investigation (WSI) and approved by the Glamorgan-Gwent Archaeological Trust (GGAT) (AAL 2023). A study area of 1km around the perimeter of the main development boundary was used to ascertain the known archaeological and historical resources.
- 3.2 The assessment comprised the examination and collation of available sources of information including:
- Information on known archaeological and historic sites recorded on the regional Historic Environment Record (HER) held and maintained by GGAT. A trawl of the local authority HER was carried out on behalf of AAL by Olivia Husøy-Ciaccia, Historic Environment Record Officer for the Glamorgan-Gwent Archaeological Trust, and the most salient results of that search (enquiry reference number: 7099) have been incorporated into this report;
- A search of available cartographic and pictorial sources, published and unpublished works, aerial photographs and any relevant web-based information;
- Searches were made of all indices of the collections of the Gwent Archives and of the National Library of Wales.
- Relevant information held by the Royal Commission on Ancient and Historic Monuments in Wales (RCAHMW) via the COFLEIN online computer database and information on Conservation Areas or Historic Landscape Areas within or in the vicinity of the site area from information held by DAT and Natural Resources Wales Landmap website;
- A search of Cadw's Listed Building records and Schedule of Ancient Monuments for designated buildings and sites of archaeological and historical importance lying on or in close proximity to the site;
- A site visit to determine the presence or absence of visible archaeology or evidence for previous ground disturbance within the proposed development area. This was made by the author on the 21st of November 2023, and a digital photographic record was made, of which **Plates 1** to **8**, and the cover photograph, form a part.
- 3.3 The results of the assessment contained in this report are intended to identify the extent and character of the known and potential archaeological resource, to assess the



likely and potential impacts of any development on that resource and to outline a possible programme of further works to mitigate those impacts. The assessment should be seen only as the first stage of the archaeological process and does not preclude the possibility that further archaeological input may be required prior to, or during, any proposed development.

3.4 All photocopies, manuscript copies and notes, including photographs, are preserved in the project archive to be stored at Avon Archaeology Ltd. The digital archive will be created, maintained and later deposited with the relevant HER and with RCAHMW as outlined in the project WSI.

4 Site Location, Topography and Geology (Figures 1 & 2)

- 4.1 The proposed development site lies on undeveloped agricultural land situated to the north of Llanellen Court (NGR SO 30303 10656), and to the south of Llanellen itself, in north-west Monmonthshire. Abergavenny lies approximately 3km to the north (**Figure 1**)
- 4.2 The site consists of one field of agricultural grassland, which is irregular in shape, and enclosed with hedgerows, trees and fencing. The area is bounded by the A4042 to the east, by another field to the north, and to the south, by Llanellen Court with associated buildings, and the road skirting the property of Oaklands. To the north-west the study area is bounded by housing fronting onto Rhoda Llwyfen/Elm Drive (**Figure 2**)
- 4.3 The site lies on land ranging in elevation from 64.5m aOD in the south-west, sloping to 52.8m aOD in the north-east corner.
- 4.4 The underlying geology is "Freshwater West Formation (St Maughan's Formation) interbedded purple, brown and green sandstones and red mudstones' from the Early Devonian period (419-394 MYA)" (BGS).

5 Historical and Archaeological Background (Figures 3-5)

The proposed development site is located to the south of the village of Llanellen, within the parish of the same name, in the upper division of the hundred of Abergavenny, in the county of Monmouthshire (Sir Fynwy) (National Gazetteer of Great Britain and Ireland,



1868). The village is recorded as 'Llanelen' on older maps, as is the Court (RCAHMW). According to the Melville Richards Archive Place Name Database, the place name was first recorded as Sancta Elena in 1254 (presumably named for the church dedicated to St Helen) and as Llanelen throughout the 15th and early 16th centuries. It was written as Lanelen in manuscripts of the later 16th century. Llanellen was a small clustered settlement at a road junction until the 19th-20th century (see **Figure 4** below), when it was enlarged to the east; it now lies within the modern community of Llanfoist Fawr.

5.1 Previous Archaeological Studies (Figure 3)

The site has not previously been subject to any archaeological assessment. In the wider Study Area, an evaluation was carried out in 2010 at Garden Plot, The Cottage, Llanelen (APAC 2010; PRN **E003319**), approximately 225m to the north-east. A field visit was also made in 2010 to Ysgubor Aur, Ty Aur Farm (PRN **E003063**) by GGAT, approximately 900m to the south-west.

5.2 The Historic Landscape (**Figure 4**)

The historic settlement area of Llanellen is shown in green on **Figure 4**. The study site itself does not lie within any Registered Historic Landscape (Cadw Cof Cymru), however, it lies just to the east of the Blaenavon RHL, the majority of which is also comprises the Blaenavon Industrial Landcape World Heritage Site (UNESCO List 984). However the nearest historic landscape area to the site, the Cwm-Mawr and Coed-y-Prior area (HLCA 016; GGAT HLC; shown in purple on **Figure 4**), is not included in the World Heritage Site; the main reason for its inclusion in the historic landscape is based on the presence of the Monmouthshire and Brecon Canal. The area is characterised as "enclosed agricultural landscape with characteristic stone built farmhouses and cottages" (*ibid*.).

The site lies within the Landmap Historic Landscape area of the Usk River Valley (MNMTHHL061). This is described as "a largely agricultural area made up predominantly of irregular fieldscapes, with a variety of settlement types. The Usk Valley has functioned since the prehistoric era as a natural communication route between the coastal lowlands of Gwent and the uplands of Powys and later as a political frontier, marking the division between the early medieval Welsh kingdoms of Gwynllwg and Gwent". It also lies within the Landmap Cultural Landcape area of Goytre Lowland (MNMTHCLS048), described as Mosaic Rolling Lowland, with high visual and sensory landscape value (DataMapWales).



Additionally, the site lies within the Llanellen Local Landscape Character Area (LLCA) LL01. The landscape and visual sensitivity to housing is described as High/Medium, with its LANDMAP value described as "high for visual & sensory, historic landscape and cultural landscape and partly high for geological landscape" (MCC 2020).

The site lies just outside the boundaries of Bannau Brycheiniog National Park, which has a spur here to the west of the Monmouthshire and Brecon Canal.

There are no registered Historic Parks and Gardens recorded within the 1km search area, the closest being Coldbrook House which lies 2km to the north-east, and Llanover Park approximately 2km to the south-west (Cadw DataMapWales).

5.3 Scheduled Ancient Monuments

There are no Scheduled Ancient Monuments (SAM) within the 1km Study Area around the proposed development site (GGAT HER). The closest is Castell Arnallt, a medieval defensive site, approximately 1.6km to the east (Cadw Cof Cymru).

5.4 Listed buildings

There are 8 Listed Building references within the 1km Study Area around the proposed development area (GGAT HER). No Listed Building lies within the proposed development area.

The closest Listed Building (c.175m to the north) is the Llanellen Parish Church of St Helen (LB 17638), a medieval church (possibly 13th century) largely rebuilt in 1851. Llanellen Bridge, built over the Usk in 1821, lies 330m to the north-east of the site (LB 17639 and 87164).

300m to the east of the site is Orchard Farmhouse (LB 1978), dated to c.1600 with later alterations, while 400m to the south is Oak Cottage (LB 2729), a prominently sited early 19^{th} century dwelling.

To the west and south-west of the site are three early 19th century bridges crossing the Monmouthshire and Brecon Canal: Heol Gerrig Bridge (Canal Bridge no 92; LB 17643); Morgans Bridge (Canal Bridge no 90, LB 17644); and Barn Bridge (Canal Bridge no 89, LB 17645).

All the above structures are Grade II Listed; all are found on the HER, Figure 5 below.

5.5 Known Archaeological Remains and Historical Development (**Figure 5**)

There are 40 sites, monuments, buildings and findspots listed on the HER within 1km of the Study Area, although nothing located within the development area. **Figure 5** shows the distribution of these core records, while the full catalogue provided by the Glamorgan-

Gwent Archaeological Trust is included in Appendix 1.

The closest known site is that of Llanellen Court itself (PRN GGAT **01342g**), located c.40m from the site boundary. It is a probably 17th century house with later additions, probably on the site of, or incorporating the remains of, a manor or court house extant in the 14th century. It has also been identified (as PRN GGAT **13586g**) as a potential historic

farmstead (as part of GGAT and Cadw's Historic Farmsteads project).

There are also 14 sites listed on the National Monuments Record (NMRW) maintained by the Royal Commission of Ancient and Historical Monuments Wales (RCAHMW) within the 1km search area. Most of these are duplicated in the HER records, with additional sites

comprising post-medieval buildings (numbers referenced as NPRN).

Two records of Roman coins discovered within the study area or its immediate environs are listed within the Portable Antiquities Scheme (PAS) database

(<u>www.finds.org.uk</u>); these are duplicated on the HER and are discussed below.

The HER sites are briefly described below, according to period, where they are

incorporated into a summary of the historical development of the area.

Prehistoric Periods

The available evidence for the Palaeolithic in Monmouthshire is limited, while nearly all Mesolithic activity is confined to the major river tributaries and shores of the Bristol Channel, although a few late Mesolithic flint scatters have been recorded around

Abergavenny. Finds from the Neolithic are more numerous, but still do not amount to much;



however two major find sites have been located in Abergavenny. There are a number of monuments dated to the Bronze Age within northern Monmouthshire, with cairns and standing stones noted to the south of Abergavenny; the landscape from the Late Bronze Age onwards was principally an agricultural one consisting of settlements and fields. In the Iron Age, Monmouthshire would have fallen within the territory of the Silures (Children and Nash, 1996)

There is no prehistoric activity recorded within the search area around the proposed development site; a single feature of unknown date (PRN GGAT01322g) records the location of a former mound (now near destroyed) which lies 615m to the SSW of the site, and may possibly be prehistoric.

Romano-British (mid-first century – early- to mid-5th century CE)

Roman activity is recorded within the Study area with three findspots of coins; an aureus of Claudius (PRN GGAT04728g) found 180m to the north of the site; electro-type copies of a gold aureus coin of Claudius (PRN GGAT02910g) approximately 725m to the southwest of the site; and a gold aureus of Claudius (PRN GGAT03645g, PAS record IARCHDECFF4) dating to 51/52CE found at Ty Aur Farm, 860m to the south-west. There were Roman forts at Abergavenny, Monmouth and Usk, as well as Venta Silurum (Caerwent). There are no Roman Roads recorded on the HER within the search area, although it is possible that a presumed Roman road from Usk to Abergavenny (Cadw 2011b, 32) ran nearby.

Medieval

The centuries after the end of Roman administration in Wales are thinly documented. During this period the early kingdoms of Wales were emerging, alongside migrations or invasions from abroad. During the early medieval period, the Study Area lay within the Kingdom of Gwent, which was divided into several administrative regions, known as cantrefi, which in turn were divided into smaller cwmwd (commotes). These cwmwd comprised maenorau (estates) made up of a number of trefi (townships). The Study Area would have belonged to the cantref of Gwent Uwch Coed (Eng: 'Gwent beyond the wood' or 'Overwent'), and the commote of the same name (RCAHMW). No known early-medieval sites are recorded within the search area around the proposed development.

During the medieval period, the area is likely to have remained largely rural. Llanellen was a parish by 1254, and the church of St Helen (PRN GGAT **02469g**; NPRN 420845) is of



possible 13th century date (CADW). The only other medieval sites recorded are the associated churchyard (PRN GGAT **08178g**) and the possible site of two water mills (PRN GGAT **01317g**) extant in the 14th century. Llanellen Court (PRN GGAT **01342g**), close to the boundary of the site, is thought to have been built on the site (or possibly incorporating the remains) of a manor or court house extant in the 14th century.

<u>Post-medieval</u> (early 16th – late 19th/early 20th century CE)

During the medieval and early modern period, Llanellen and the surrounding area appear to have been still relatively sparsely populated, with the area remaining a largely agricultural one throughout the post-medieval period.

Llanellen Court itself (PRN GGAT **01342g** and **13856g**; NPRN 45080), 40m to the southwest of the boundary of the proposed development site, is described in the HER summary as a probable 17th century house with later additions (though see above for possible medieval origins). The first reference to the building found under this name comes from the Hereford Times of 26 April 1862 when Peter Morgan of Llanelen Court, was appointed as a Parish Guardian; however, the same paper on 15 April 1854 also listed James Morgan of *Court Farm*, Llanelen, as being elected Guardian of the Poor - see section 6.3 on the tithe map below (British Newspaper Archive). No references to this property have been found under either name in the catalogues of the Gwent Archives, the National Library of Wales, or the National Archives.

Four other post-medieval farmsteads have been identified in the area: Orchard Farm (PRN GGAT **01345g/13684g**; NPRN 20545; also a Listed Building, see above), built c.1600 and situated c.280m to the east of the site; Little Glan Usk (PRN GGAT **13683g**) c.410m to the NE; Upper Heol-cerig (PRN GGAT **13587g**), c.480m to the north-west; and Great Hardwick (PRN GGAT **01351g** and **13682g**; NPRN 37019), dating to c.1600 or even earlier, with later additions. The garden at The Hardwick is also recorded on the NMRW (NPRN 265938). Only recorded on the NMRW, Glan Usk (NPRN 36919), c990m to the east of the site, is also a post-medieval house, as is Beili Gilas (NPRN 301105), c.620m to the southeast. The so-called Llanellen Chapel (PRN GGAT **01343g**; NPRN 36611), c.860m to the east, which is now a complete ruin, is actually another house of probably 16th century date – though little remains on aerial photographs buried remains may survive.

During the early nineteenth century, the only major change in the area was the construction of the Brecknock and Abergavenny Canal (PRN GGAT 03263.0g), part of the



Monmouthshire and Brecon Canal, which lies 330m to the south-west of the site. The above-mentioned Grade II listed bridges (PRNs GGAT 03263.28g, 03263.30g and 03263.31g), as well as a footbridge (PRN GGAT 03263.29g), a 20th century steel bridge (PRN GGAT 03263.32g), a stile (PRN GGAT 03263.124g), and three GWR boundary markers (PRNs GGAT 03263.125g, 03263.126g and 03263.127g) are all linked with this canal. A limekiln near to bridge 92 (PRN GGAT 11600g; NPRN 85152), c.540m to the north-west is also associated with the canal, while Twyn-Glas Farmhouse (PRN GGAT 11603g), c.900m to the south, is a 19th century farmhouse built alongside the canal; its accompanying barn has the remains of a furnace (Twyn-Glas Furnace, NPRN 85435). Craig yr Hafod tramroad to the limestone quarries of Llanover (NPRN 414350) lies across the canal from Twyn-Glas.

Llanellen Bridge (PRN GGAT **01380g**; NPRN 24216), built in 1821 over the River Usk, has already been mentioned in Listed Buildings, as has the early 19th century Oak Cottage (PRN GGAT **07817g**; NPRN 20497).

The former School at Llanellen (NPRN 418206), approximately 250m to the north of the site, was built in 1862.

Approximately 650m to the west of the site is a trackway of unknown date shown on 1st edition OS mapping (PRN GGAT **10194g**); just west of this are two structures also shown on the 1st edition: one of unknown date (PRN GGAT **10196g**) and the other postmedieval (PRN GGAT **10518g**). Approximately 675m to the south-west of the site is another structure of unknown date, shown on 1st edition OS mapping (PRN GGAT **10519g**).

6 Cartographic Background (Figures 6-11)

6.1 A number of 18th and early 19th century maps depict Llanellen (or Llanelen/Lanelen), although not in sufficient detail to show more than the location of the village. No maps or plans showing the proposed development site itself prior to the 19th century were held at Gwent Archives.

6.2 The original OS surveyors drawing of 1813 (**Figure 6**) shows the roads, the River Usk, the Monmouthshire and Brecon Canal, and the farmsteads in the area. It also shows field boundaries, although the accuracy of these is uncertain. The Llanellen Court buildings are shown to the right of the label 'Danycoed', and the proposed development site lies to the north of this; the field boundaries depicted do not appear to match those shown on later mapping.



6.3 The single most important and useful historic map which covers the Candidate site is without doubt the tithe commutation 'Plan of the parish of Llanellen in the County of Monmouth' of 1847, together with its accompanying award. The tithe map can be easily accessed via the National Library of Wales website, which forms the basis of Figure 7. The apportionments relating to the map were also examined via this website. The tithe map appears to represent the earliest surviving, complete, large-scale survey of Llanellen parish, to include relatively accurate field boundaries and buildings extant at the time of the survey. The field currently proposed for development is shown on this tithe map as part of the plot numbered 95, together with a small area of the plot numbered 126.

Table 1 presents data from the tithe apportionment on ownership, occupation and land use for the plots found within, or partially within the red-line boundary:

No field names are given, and the information presented in the table does not appear to hold any archaeological implications for the project. C.K Tynte Esq is most likely to be Charles Kemeys Kemeys-Tynte (1778-1860) who was MP for Bridgwater, Somerset from 1820 to 1837; this indicates that the land in question was part of the Kemeys-Tynte estate. James Morgan is on the 1851 census³ as a farmer of 202 acres, employing 6 men. Mrs Phillips may be the Ann Phillips aged 75 in 1851, described as a 'gentlewoman'.

The next map to depict the Candidate site in detail is the 1st Edition 25" Ordnance 6.4 Survey Map (Surveyed 1879-1881, Published 1882; Figure 8). Llanelen Court is shown to the south of the proposed development site, with the site itself comprising the majority of the large field numbered 300, and a small corner of the field numbered 298. A footpath runs approximately north to south across the western end of the site, from Llanelen Court a corner of the field. A number of trees are depicted within the field as well as on the boundaries.

- 6.5 The Second Edition 25" Ordnance Survey map (revised in 1900 and published 1901; see **Figure 9**) depicts the Study Area as unchanged from the previous map; trees are no longer depicted either within the field or on the boundaries.
- 6.6 The Second Edition OS map described above was utilised a base for the Land Valuation Plan of 1910 (**Figure 9**). The proposed development area is shown as part of an estate around Llanellen Court, bounded in purple and numbered 2773, with a small area of an adjoining field, which forms part of a small estate around Llanellen House, shaded yellow and numbered 2774. Table 2 presents data from the Valuation Book which accompanies these plans (Gwent Archives GB0218.D1763.13):

This shows that the proposed development area was still part of the Kemeys-Tynte estate at this date. A 1915 plan of the Kemeys-Tynte Estate including the parish of Llanellen is held by the National Library of Wales, but is unlikely to show any more detail as it is drawn at a scale of 1:5000 (the 25 inch maps are approximately 1:2500). Outlying portions of the Kemeys-Tynte Estate, including properties in the parish of Llanellen, were sold in September 1915 (National Library of Wales, Welsh Newspapers, Abergavenny Chronicle 10th September 1915).

To the south-east of the proposed development site, a drawing in pencil depicts a building, situated approximately where Oaklands is now; however, this is not shown on the following maps, so may have been added considerably later.

- 6.7 The 6" map revised in 1916 (published 1922; **Figure 10**) depicts the proposed development site as unchanged from the Second Edition of 1901.
- 6.8 The 6" Ordnance Survey map revised in 1944 and published 1953 (**Figure 11**) depicts the proposed development site as unchanged from previous maps.



7 AERIAL PHOTOGRAPHY AND LiDAR EVIDENCE (Figures 12-16 – images by courtesy of the Welsh Government)

7.1 A series of historic aerial photographs of the site and its immediate surroundings was obtained from the Welsh Government. These cover various dates from the Second World War, up to 1982.⁴

An RAF vertical image of 1940 shows the site with field boundaries as they are seen on the maps above. The footpath is just visible to the west of the site, and a single large tree is in the centre of the field (Figure 12 4017 MWO RAF A21 14049). The photograph is slightly blurry and no other features are visible. However, an RAF vertical image of 1948 (Figure 13 4817 RAFCPE UK_2472 4109 1948) is much clearer, and not only can the footpath been seen, but also several probable field boundaries, which divide the field up into small areas and must pre-date the tithe map. The line running through the middle of the site from east to west may represent a field boundary or possibly a palaeochannel. There are also a number of other small features which are not shown on contemporary maps and are of unknown type and date. A vertical image of 1969 (Figure 14 6929 OS69 07 4010) is not quite as clear, but still shows possible former field boundaries. Housing had begun to be constructed within the field to the north-west of the site, and the southern part of that field boundary had been removed - the line of the corner is just visible. To the south-east of the site, the building called Oaklands (on Figure 2) had been built sometime between 1948 and 1969, although the road to its north, now bounding the site, had not yet been constructed. Additional farm buildings had been added to the south of Llanellen Court. An image of 1982 (Figure 15 OS82_009 016) shows that the housing estate to the north-west had been completed by this date, and the field boundary is as it is today. To the south-east, the road around Oaklands had yet to be constructed. Two possible former field boundaries are visible.

Some of the features visible on these aerial images are also supported by the LiDAR data (**Figure 16**). The palaeochannel and field boundaries shown on the LiDAR are also visible on the images from 1948 (**Figure 13**), 1969 (**Figure 14**) and 1982 (**Figure 15**). A disturbed area identified from the LiDAR close to the north-western boundary is possibly visible on Figure 15, and may be related to the construction of the housing estate.

8 SITE VISIT

- 8.1 A site visit was paid by the author on Tuesday 21st November, 2023, in overcast conditions, during which time a photographic record of the study area was made. A selection of the survey is represented on the **Cover**, and in **Plates 1-8**.
- 8.2 The site comprises a large field to the south of Llanellen, and to the north-east of Llanellen Court. The site was accessed via a gate to the south-east, and it is currently laid to pasture. Mapping and aerial photography indicate that a former boundary hedge to the north-west of the site was removed sometime between 1948 and 1969, but there is no longer any indication at ground level of the removed boundary.
- 8.3 The site contains no upstanding structures other than a wooden pole carrying cables (see **Cover**). There is small fenced-off area to the south east (see **Plate 5**). Mapping indicates a footpath crossing the site, but no indication of this was visible on the ground. A large tree in the middle of the field appears to have been present since at least 1948 from the aerial photography. The northern end of the field was extremely waterlogged and muddy, with standing water in an area to the north-east.

9 CONCLUSION

9.1 This assessment has found that there are no Scheduled Ancient Monuments or listed buildings within the bounds of the study area or in the immediate vicinity. It does not lie within any formally designated Conservation Area; however, it does lie close to the Blaenavon World Heritage Site and Bannau Brycheiniog National Park, and falls within the



Usk River Valley Historic Landscape area, and the Llanellen Local Landscape Character Area, both of which are of high value for visual, sensory, and historic landscape. An assessment of the cartographic evidence indicated that the study area was, and had always been undeveloped land within the period of mapping that was available. The main focus of archaeological activity within this area appears to be mostly agricultural, with the exception of the nearby Monmouthshire and Brecon Canal and associated features.

9.2 The proposed development consists of the erection of 25-30 houses across the development area. No archaeological intervention has ever been carried out in the study area, so the presence or absence of buried archaeological remains cannot be ascertained from a review of the documentary evidence alone. The area does have a minimal potential, based on its surroundings, as well as evidence from aerial photography, for undiscovered archaeological resources to be present. Construction of houses along with associated infrastructure (roads, services etc.) and landscaping has the potential to cause damage to any currently unknown archaeological remains of post-medieval or earlier date that may be present within the site. None of these potential assets are considered to represent an in principal constraint to development, but may well require further investigation or mitigation. The proposed development will not affect views from any Scheduled Monument as none are within 1km of the site, but may affect views from some near-by Listed Buildings.

Site Location Map Grid Lines at 1000m Intervals



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









Results of the HER Trawl Showing Events also showing Red Line Boundary




Results of the HER Trawl Showing Historic Settings and Landscape Areas

Approximate Location of the Site Overlain onto an Extract From the OS Surveyors Drawing, 1813




Red Line Boundary of the Site Overlain onto an Extract from the Parish of Llanellen Tithe Map, 1847






Red Line Boundary of the Site Overlain onto an Extract from the 25" OS Map, Surveyed 1879-81, Published 1882.



Red Line Boundary of the Site Overlain onto an Extract from the 6" OS Map, Revised 1916, Published 1922.








Red Line Boundary of the Site Overlain onto an Extract from a 1940 Aerial Photograph (4017 MWO 10 RAF A21 14049)












Red Line Boundary of the Site Overlain onto an Extract from a 1948 Aerial Photograph (4817 RAFCPE UK_2472 4109)



The building is constructed in local red sandstone with small river boulders; yellow sandstone was also employed in the Victorian period. The surviving medieval structure of the building appears to be of one build and 15th/16th century date; this comprises the original part of the nave, rood stair and porch. However, since the rebuilt chancel is on a different alignment from the nave, it is probable that (1) the Victorian builders reused the medieval foundations, and (2) that the chancel which they replaced was of a different period from the nave (and therefore almost certainly earlier). The vestry door is medieval, and probably reset; it may originally have been the priest's door. The main structural problem for the medieval work concerns the two types of facing used in the fabric of the medieval walls, (1) a coursed rubble constructed from thin blocks of red sandstone, and (2) coursed rubble of thicker blocks red sandstone and small river boulders. The first type of masonry appears generally at the bottoms of the walls; higher up it appears in irregular patches interspersed with the second type. Although visibility is generally good on the exterior, it is not possible to determine this for sure without an examination with the joints raked out: the interior is plastered throughout. The two types of masonry probably indicates a partial refacing of the original medieval work; it appears superficially as though the second type has been used to patch the first, and the first is similar to that used elswhere in other churches around Abergavenny (Llanvetherine, Llanvapley) in conjunction with Perpendicular windows. The chancel, vestry and bellcote dating to the Victorian restoration, when the nave was also lengthened by 12 ft (nearly 4m) and provided with an external cornice to match that around the chancel and (probably) a new chancel arch. The Victorian masonry consists of squared blocks of red and yellow sandstone laid in snecked courses, quoined with red sandstone ashlar, and with a coarse yellow sandstone used for the dressings around the windows and the cornice. The chancel arch appears to be in a fine-grained limestone, and therefore probably part of the Victorian rebuild, but since the eggshell paint which previously covered it has not been completely removed, it is difficult to be certain of this on a superficial examination.
